Eat Whole, Unprocessed Foods

Focus your diet on whole foods: lean proteins (chicken, fish, tofu, eggs), non-starchy vegetables (cucumber, lettuce, broccoli, bell peppers), healthy fats (avocado, nuts, olive oil), and small portions of complex carbohydrates (quinoa, oats, brown rice). Effective Exercises to Tighten Your Core

- **Leg Raises:** Lie on your back, legs straight. Lift them to a 90-degree angle, then slowly lower them just above the floor without arching your back. This strengthens the lower abs.
- **Dead Bug:** Lie on your back with arms extended toward the ceiling and knees bent at 90 degrees. Slowly extend your right arm and left leg toward the floor without arching your back. Return and repeat on the other side. Excellent for deep core stability.
- **Mountain Climbers:** In a plank position, drive your knees alternately toward your chest at a brisk pace. This combines cardio with core work.
- **Russian Twists:** Sit with knees bent, lean back slightly, and twist your torso side to side, optionally holding a light weight. This sculpts the obliques.

Important: Quality over quantity. Do each movement with perfect form, engaging your belly button toward your spine. Breathe naturally—exhale as you contract. Avoid straining your neck.

Lifestyle Habits That Make a Difference

Beyond diet and exercise, your daily habits play a huge role in how flat your stomach appears. Small tweaks can yield big results.

Prioritize Sleep

Lack of sleep increases the stress hormone cortisol, which promotes

fat storage in the abdominal area and can cause water retention. Aim for 7 to 9 hours of quality sleep per night. A well-rested body also makes better food choices and has more energy for exercise.
