Preparing the Skin for a Flawless Application

If your skin is very dry, a very light application of an oil-free, water-based lotion to the driest spots (elbows, knees) can be acceptable, but less is more.
3. **Remove Hair and Consider Waxing Timing:** If you plan to wax or shave, do so at least 24 hours before the spray tan. Freshly shaved or waxed skin has open pores and a disturbed barrier, which can lead to dark dots or uneven coverage. Conversely, if you shave right after a tan, you may remove the developing color.

Skin Type and Tone Considerations

Not every solution works for every skin tone. Fair skin often benefits from a lighter DHA percentage (3–6%) with a blue or violet undertone to neutralize any potential orange shift. Medium skin tones can handle moderate percentages (6–10%) with golden or warm undertones. Olive or darker skin may require higher DHA (10–15%) and richer brown undertones for depth. A professional consultation or a patch test is always the safest route.

The Application Process: Device and Technique

After spraying, the client should remain standing or in a setting position that avoids creasing in the legs or under the arms until the solution dries.

Aftercare for Long-Lasting Results

Once the solution is applied, the next 8 to 12 hours are critical. During this window, the DHA is actively reacting with the skin. Disturbing this process can result in a lighter or uneven tan. Here are the essential aftercare steps to maximize the lifespan of your spray tan.

- **Do not get wet:** Avoid water, sweat, rain, or condensation. Swimming, showering, intense exercise, or even heavy humidity can disrupt the development.
- **Wear loose, dark clothing:** Tight jeans or synthetic fabrics can rub off the solution and cause lines. Opt for loose cotton dresses or sweatpants. The color will transfer initially—this is normal.
- **Rinse, don't scrub:** After the recommended development time (check the product instructions—usually 4–8 hours for standard, 1–2 for express), rinse off the bronzer with lukewarm water. Do not use soap or scrub. Pat dry gently with a soft towel.
- **Moisturize daily:** Hydrated skin sheds slower. Use a gentle, oil-free, fragrance-free moisturizer every day to prolong the tan. Avoid products with alpha hydroxy acids (AHAs) or retinoids, as they accelerate exfoliation.
- **Avoid long baths or pools:** Chlorine and hot water both strip the tan. Quick, lukewarm showers are best. If you swim, apply a waterproof sunscreen (which also offers UV protection) and rinse off immediately after.
