- **E minor (Em):** A standard open Em chord. This provides the emotional grounding for the verse.

It is crucial to practice the transition between the Cadd9 and G chord. This movement forms the backbone of the song's harmonic structure. The open strings in the Cadd9 shape create a drone effect that is characteristic of Loeb's guitar style.

The Signature Strumming and Fingerpicking Pattern

Knowing the chords is only half the battle. The real secret to the "Lisa Loeb Stay guitar chords" lies in the rhythm. The song is not a simple down-up strum. It features a specific pattern that blends a gentle fingerpicked arpeggio with a percussive, muted strum. This technique gives the song its distinctive, nervous energy that perfectly matches the lyrical theme of waiting and longing.

Breaking Down the Song Structure

Tips for Capturing the "Lisa Loeb" Sound

Beyond the notes and rhythms, capturing the essence of "Stay" involves paying attention to a few key production and performance elements. First, consider your guitar. Loeb is often associated with a small-bodied acoustic guitar, such as a parlor guitar or a 00-size, which has a more balanced, less boomy sound than a large dreadnought.
