- Junie B. Jones Is Not a Crook** (1997) – Junie B. finds a mittens and must decide what to do with it.
- Junie B. Jones Is a Party Animal** (1997) – Junie B. spends the night at her rich friend Lucille's house.

Continuing the Kindergarten Year

The series continued with many more adventures that spanned the entire school year. These books introduced more characters, like the bumbling bus driver Mr. Woo, and deepened the friendships with Grace and Lucille. The holiday-themed books are particularly beloved. Continuing the **Junie B Jones in order**, the remaining kindergarten titles are:

- Junie B. Jones Is a Beauty Shop Guy** (1998) – Junie B. decides to become a beauty shop guy and gives herself a new hairstyle.

- Junie B. Jones Smells Something Fishy** (1998) – Pet Day at school leads to a smelly situation.
 - Junie B. Jones Is (almost) a Flower Girl** (1999) – Junie B. wants to be a flower girl in her aunt's wedding.
 - Junie B. Jones and the Mushy Gushy Valentine** (1999) – A Valentine's Day story about friendship and a secret admirer.
 - Junie B. Jones Has a Peep in Her Pocket** (2000) – A field trip to a farm yields a surprise "peep."
 - Junie B. Jones Is Captain Field Day** (2001) – Junie B. is the captain of her team for Field Day, but she isn't very athletic.
 - Junie B. Jones Is a Graduation Girl** (2001) – Junie B. prepares for kindergarten graduation.
- These seventeen books form the core of the kindergarten experience, but the series didn't stop there. A few additional kindergarten titles were released later, filling in gaps in the school year.

- Junie B., First Grader (at last!)** (2001) – This book is the bridge to the next phase.
- Junie B. Jones Is Not Your Valentine** (2007) – A later-published Valentine's Day story that fits in the kindergarten timeline.
- Junie B. Jones and the Stupid Smelly Bus** (This was the first, so we've covered it).

The First Grader Series: A New Chapter

After a successful kindergarten year, Barbara Park continued the series with **Junie B., First Grader** books. The transition to first grade brought new challenges: a new teacher (Mr. Scary), new subjects like math and spelling, and a much bigger school. The final book in the entire series, published posthumously in 2013, is **Junie B., First Grader: Turkeys We Have Loved and Eaten (and Other Thankful Stuff)**. This book brings the series to a natural and heartwarming conclusion, focusing on Thanksgiving and the importance of family.

The Special Editions and Supplements

Besides the main novels, there are a few special books that fit into the **Junie B Jones in order** but offer a different format. The most notable is **Top-Secret Personal Beeswax: A Journal by Junie B. (and Me!)** (2003).
