How to Draw a Cute Cat

1. **Start with a circle for the head.** Draw a medium-sized circle near the top of your paper. This will be your cat's head.

3. **Draw a large oval below for the body.** The oval should overlap the bottom of the head circle slightly.

4. **Add a fluffy tail.** A small circle at the back of the body works perfectly.

6. **Refine and shade.** Clean up your lines and use soft shading to define the bunny's roundness. Pay special attention to the insides of the ears.

How to Draw a Beautiful Butterfly

1. **Draw a small oval for the body.** Keep it vertical and centered on your page.
2. **Add two small circles on top for antennae.** Use curved lines to connect them to the head.
