- **WJW-TV (Channel 8):** The Fox affiliate. Owned by Nexstar Media Group, WJW produces "Fox 8 News," a ratings powerhouse in the market. WJW is famous for "Fox 8 News in the Morning," a long-running, high-energy show. It is also the home of the "NFL on Fox," which often features Cleveland Browns games, as well as prime-time hits like "The Simpsons" and "9-1-1: Lone Star."
- **WVIZ (Channel 25) / WEO (Channel 49):** The PBS member stations serving the region. WVIZ produces "Ideastream Public Media," offering local programming like "The Sound of Ideas" and "Applause." Nationally, PBS provides iconic content such as "Masterpiece," "Antiques Roadshow," and "Nova."

They cover city council meetings, local politics, high school sports, and investigations that matter to the community.
