

iPhone 3g Teardown Guide

Step-by-Step Teardown Process

Step 1: Remove the SIM Card Tray

Insert a SIM card eject tool (or a straightened paperclip) into the small hole on the right side of the device. Gently push to pop out the SIM tray. Set the tray and SIM card aside in a safe place. Step 2: Remove the Two Bottom Screws

Using the pentalobe screwdriver, remove the two screws flanking the 30-pin dock connector at the bottom edge of the iPhone 3G. These screws are short and have a distinct five-pointed star shape. Place them in a labeled container — they are not interchangeable with other screws in the device.

Step 3: Separate the Front Panel from the Rear Case

Apply the suction cup to the lower half of the digitizer (the glass above the display). Gently lift to create a small gap. Insert a plastic opening tool into the gap and carefully slide it along the edge to release the plastic clips that hold the front panel to the rear case. Work your way around the entire perimeter. Be patient — the clips are brittle. Once all clips are disengaged, tilt the front panel up from the bottom, but do not pull it away completely, as the front panel is still connected to the logic board via a set of ribbon cables.

Step 4: Disconnect the Battery and Other Connectors

With the front panel resting at an angle, you will see the logic board and several ribbon cables. Locate the battery connector on the top-left side of the logic board (near the rear-facing camera). Use the flathead spudger to gently pry up the battery connector. This cuts power to the device and prevents shorts during further disassembly. Next, disconnect the display and digitizer cables: there are two or three cables clipped to the logic board near the bottom. Lift each connector gently using the spudger. Now you can fully separate the front panel assembly (screen, digitizer, and earpiece) from the rear case.

Step 5: Remove the Logic Board

With the front panel removed, you have access to the main logic board. Begin by removing the EMI shield (small metal cover) over the logic board, secured by two Phillips screws. Then disconnect the remaining ribbon cables attached to the logic board: the dock connector, front-facing camera, and audio jack flex cable. Use tweezers to carefully lift the connectors. Finally, remove the two Phillips screws that hold the logic board itself. Gently lift the logic board from the bottom edge, being mindful of any cables that may still be attached. Set the logic board aside in an anti-static bag or on a mat.

Step 6: Remove Other Components (Battery, Speaker, Camera, etc.)

The battery is located at the top of the rear case, adhered with double-sided tape. Using a plastic pry tool, gently lift the battery from the bottom edge. Do not use metal tools as they may puncture the battery. Once removed, you can extract the loudspeaker module (at the bottom left) by prying it from its recess. The vibrator motor (a small cylindrical component) is near the speaker; pop it out using tweezers. The rear-facing camera module is attached to the top-right corner of the rear case — lift it with the spudger. The front-facing camera (if present in later revisions) is part of the front panel assembly. The headphone jack and power button flex cables are also accessible at this stage, but replacement is less common. Take note of each component's original position for reassembly.

Detailed Component Overview

Understanding the parts you've removed adds context to the teardown and helps with troubleshooting. Below is a brief overview of the major components of the iPhone 3G.

Battery

The iPhone 3G uses a 3.7V 1150 mAh lithium-ion battery. It is proprietary and soldered to a small connector board. Over time, this battery degrades and may swell, making replacement a common reason for a teardown. Swollen batteries should be disposed of properly.

Display and Digitizer

The front panel assembly combines the LCD display and touch-sensitive digitizer. These are fused together in the iPhone 3G, meaning you cannot replace one without the other. The assembly connects to the logic board via two main ribbon cables — one for the LCD and one for the digitizer. Cracks in the glass usually require full assembly replacement.

Logic Board

The logic board houses the CPU (Samsung S5L8900), 128 MB of RAM, and 8 GB or 16 GB of NAND flash storage. It also includes the WiFi/Bluetooth module, baseband processor, and power management IC. This delicate board is protected by an EMI shield. Handle it with extreme care.

Rear Camera and Front Camera

The rear camera is a 2-megapixel fixed-focus unit. The front camera was not present in the original iPhone 3G (it appeared in the 3GS). Some later production runs may include a front-facing camera module, but it's rare. Both cameras are easily removable with a spudger.

Speaker and Vibrator

The loudspeaker is a small module located at the bottom left inside the rear case. It is held in place by friction and a small adhesive. The vibrator motor is a cylindrical eccentric rotating mass (ERM) type, also seated in a bracket.

Connector Flex Cables

The dock connector, headphone jack, power button, and volume button are all connected via flex cables that plug into the logic board. These cables are fragile and prone to tearing if not handled gently. They can be replaced individually if damaged.

This component overview gives you a deeper appreciation for the engineering inside the iPhone 3G and aids in diagnosing issues that might require a teardown.

Reassembly Tips

Putting the iPhone 3G back together is essentially the reverse of the disassembly steps, but a few tips will ensure success:

2. **Align the front panel carefully.** The plastic clips must snap back into the rear case without forcing them. Start at the top and gently press down around the edges.
3. **Use the correct screws.** The two pentalobe screws from Step 2 must go back into the bottom edge. Using longer screws can puncture the logic board. If you've misplaced them, source exact replacements.
4. **Apply new adhesive if needed.** The original adhesive strips may lose their grip. Consider using thin double-sided adhesive tape (specifically for mobile phones) around the front panel edge to ensure a snug fit and prevent dust ingress.
5. **Test before final closure.** Before fully snapping the front panel into place, power on the device to confirm the display, touch, buttons, and camera function correctly. If something doesn't work, reopen and check cable connections.

Reassembly of the iPhone 3G is often more straightforward than with modern devices, but patience and careful alignment remain key. With practice, you can complete the entire process in under 30 minutes.
