Protecting Students and Staff: The Life-Saving Mission of the I Love U Guys Foundation

Rather than focusing solely on grief, the Keyes family channeled their energy into creating a practical, adaptable system that schools could use to respond to any threat or hazard. They recognized that many schools lacked consistent, easy-to-understand language for emergencies. Teachers and staff were often confused by jargon or complex plans that varied from district to district. The foundation set out to change that by developing a simple, actionable protocol that anyone could follow.

The Foundation’s Mission and Core Principles

The mission of the I Love U Guys Foundation is straightforward: to restore and protect the joy of youth through proven programs that create confidence and capacity in school communities. The foundation accomplishes this through two primary initiatives: the **Standard Response Protocol (SRP)** and the **Standard Reunification Method (SRM)**. Both are built on the principles of consistency, simplicity, and training. The goal is not to design a one-size-fits-all plan, but to provide a common language and set of actions that can be adapted to any school’s unique environment.

The foundation’s work is grounded in research, collaboration with law enforcement and emergency management experts, and feedback from thousands of educators who have implemented the programs. All resources are offered at no cost, emphasizing the foundation’s commitment to equity in school safety. No school should be unable to protect its students due to budget constraints.

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP): A Common Language for Crises

The cornerstone of the I Love U Guys Foundation’s work is the **Standard Response Protocol (SRP)**. This protocol provides a simple, five-action framework that replaces the confusing B-K-C (Bomb, Kill, Code...) systems that were previously common in many schools. The five actions are:

- **Hold:** Used when hallways need to be cleared and normal activities continue within classrooms. For example, a medical emergency in the hallway or a minor disturbance.
- **Secure:** Used when there is a threat or hazard outside the school building. Exterior doors are locked, and normal activities continue inside. This is common during police activity in the neighborhood or a nearby animal threat.
- **Lockdown:** Used when there is a threat inside the school building. All doors are locked, lights are turned off, students and staff move out of sight, and silence is maintained. This is the action most associated with active shooter or intruder events.
- **Evacuate:** Used to move students and staff from the building to a designated assembly area, typically for threats like fire or gas leaks. The protocol includes specific procedures for evacuation routes and accountability.
- **Shelter:** Used for natural hazards such as tornadoes, earthquakes, or hazardous materials spills. The specific posture (e.g., drop and cover, seal the room) depends on the hazard.

Each action is accompanied by simple clear directions: for example, "Lockdown! Locks, Lights, Out of Sight!" This consistent language ensures that regardless of which school a student or staff member is in, they will understand the expected response. The SRP is not just for schools—many businesses, churches, and government agencies have adopted it as well.

The foundation provides posters, training videos, and drill guides to help schools implement the SRP effectively. They stress that regular practice and drills are essential for the protocol to become

automatic. With repeated training, the cognitive load during an actual emergency is reduced, allowing staff to focus on dynamic decision-making.

The Standard Reunification Method (SRM): Getting Students Back to Families Safely

While the SRP addresses the immediate emergency response, the **Standard Reunification Method (SRM)** focuses on what happens after the crisis ends: reuniting students with their parents or guardians. Often, the aftermath of an evacuation or lockdown can be chaotic, with panicked families arriving at the school before officials are ready. The SRM provides a structured, safe process for reunification that minimizes confusion and reduces stress.

Key components of the SRM include:

1. **Establishing a Reunification Site:** A location away from the affected building where families can gather. It is often a neutral site like a nearby church or community center.
2. **Parent Check-In and Verification:** Parents are required to show identification and are matched against authorized pickup lists. This prevents unauthorized individuals from taking children.
3. **Student Release Procedure:** Students are escorted from the holding area to the release area one at a time. Staff members use a student release form to document each transfer.
4. **Mental Health Support:** The SRM includes provisions for crisis counselors and trauma-informed care at the reunification site.

The SRM is critical because it addresses a gap in many emergency plans. Even if a school evacuates successfully, a disorganized reunification can lead to secondary incidents, including abductions or emotional trauma. The I Love U Guys Foundation offers free training and templates to help schools craft their own reunification plans.

Training and Resources: Empowering Communities

The I Love U Guys Foundation does not just create protocols; it provides extensive training to ensure they are understood and applied correctly. The foundation offers free webinars, in-person training sessions (often in partnership with law enforcement agencies), and downloadable toolkits. Their website (iloveuguy.org) is a treasure trove of resources, including printable posters, drill checklists, parent communication templates, and video demonstrations.

One of the most innovative aspects of their training is the use of tabletop exercises and scenario-based drills. These allow staff and students to practice decision-making in a low-stress environment, building muscle memory. The foundation also emphasizes the importance of involving the whole community—including parents, bus drivers, and cafeteria workers—in safety planning.

Another valuable resource is the **Parent Guide to School Safety**, which helps families understand the SRP and SRM, so they know what to expect when they hear "Secure" vs. "Lockdown." This transparency reduces panic and builds trust between schools and the families they serve.

Impact and Recognition: Saving Lives Through Structured Response

Since its inception, the I Love U Guys Foundation has seen remarkable adoption. According to the foundation, over 40,000 schools, agencies, and organizations across the United States and in several other countries use the Standard Response Protocol. The SRM has been used successfully in real events, including the 2018 Santa Fe High School shooting in Texas, where the protocol helped streamline reunification.

The foundation's work has been endorsed by numerous educational and public safety organizations, including the National Association of School Psychologists, the National Association of School Resource Officers, and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). In many states, legislation now mandates public schools to adopt a standard response protocol, and the I Love U Guys Foundation's model is often the one cited.

Most importantly, the foundation has sparked a cultural shift in how schools view safety. Instead of relying on secret codes or complex manuals, schools now have a transparent, easy-to-teach system that gives everyone—from a kindergartener to a substitute teacher—the confidence to act quickly and correctly.

The foundation intentionally leaves these details to local school safety teams, who know their building layouts and community resources best. The protocol is a foundation, not a complete building.
