1. National Lampoon's Vacation (1983)

Along the way they encounter a legless mechanic, a dead aunt tied to the roof, and the infamous "Moose" incident. This original installment is often considered the best of the series, blending heartfelt moments with cringe-comedy. 6. Vacation (2015)

A reboot directed by John Francis Daley and Jonathan Goldstein. Instead of Chevy Chase in the lead, we follow an adult Rusty Griswold (Ed Helms) who decides to take his own wife (Christina Applegate) and two sons on a road trip to Walley World.
