The Transition: Introducing Andrew Child

As of 2025, the answer to who writes the Jack Reacher novels is definitively **Andrew Child**, with Lee Child serving as a co-author and guiding hand. The most recent books, including **The Secret** (2023) and the upcoming titles, are credited to both brothers on the cover, but the process has shifted to where Andrew is the primary writer.

Lee Child has stated that he will continue to be involved as long as he enjoys it and feels he can contribute meaningfully. However, he has also made it clear that he is comfortable with the series being in Andrew's hands. This is not a temporary arrangement; it is a succession plan executed with remarkable foresight and care.

Books Co-Authored by Lee and Andrew Child

The novels written under the partnership include:

- **The Sentinel** (2020)
- **Better Off Dead** (2021)
- **No Plan B** (2022)
- **The Secret** (2023)
- **Safe Enough** (2024)

The collaboration has proven that a beloved franchise can evolve without losing its core identity, provided the transition is handled with respect for the source material and the audience.
