Grade 5 (Multi-Step and Real-World)

- "Mia bought 4 packs of pencils. Each pack has 12 pencils. She also bought 3 packs of pens with 8 pens each. How many writing tools did she buy?" ($4 \times 12 + 3 \times 8 = 48 + 24 = 72$)
- "A rectangular garden is 15 feet long and 9 feet wide. What is the area?" ($15 \times 9 = 135$ square feet)
- "A bakery sells 24 cookies per tray. They have 8 trays. If each cookie sells for \$2, how much money do they make?" ($24 \times 8 = 192$ cookies; $192 \times 2 = \$384$)

Integrating Interactive Elements in a Multiplication Word Problems Ppt
