- High cards (10, Jack, Queen, King, Ace):** -1

As each card is dealt, you add or subtract these values to maintain a running count. For example, if the first two cards dealt are a 5 (+1) and a King (-1), your running count becomes 0. Betting Strategies for Card Counters

- True count +3:** Bet 4 units.
