The Treskilling Yellow is a unique stamp that was supposed to be printed in blue-green but was accidentally printed in yellow-orange, the color reserved for the eight-skilling denomination. The Mauritius "Post Office" Stamps (1847)

The Mauritius "Post Office" stamps are among the earliest stamps issued outside of Great Britain. Two denominations were produced: an orange-red one penny and a deep blue two pence. The stamps are famous for their inscription, which reads "Post Office" instead of the intended "Post Paid." Only 27 copies of both denominations are known to exist, making them extremely rare. The stamps were produced for an invitation to a ball hosted by the governor's wife, adding a layer of social history to their allure. In 2011, an unused pair of these stamps sold for over \$1.9 million.

The Inverted Jenny (1918)

Perhaps the most famous error in United States philately, the Inverted Jenny is a 24-cent airmail stamp featuring a Curtiss JN-4 airplane. The central image of the plane was printed upside down in relation to the frame. A single sheet

of 100 stamps with this error was discovered by a collector named William Robey on the day of issue. The sheet was immediately sold, and over the years, the stamps have been broken up and sold individually. A single Inverted Jenny can fetch between \$100,000 and \$200,000, depending on condition. A complete block of four is an extraordinary rarity, valued in the millions. The story of its accidental discovery and the frantic pursuit by postal officials is one of the great tales of stamp collecting.

The Hawaiian Missionaries (1851)

The Hawaiian Missionaries are a set of stamps issued by the Kingdom of Hawaii, produced for use by missionaries to send mail back to the mainland United States. They were printed in very small quantities and on thin, poor-quality paper. Consequently, very few have survived. The rarest of the set is the two-cent blue, used to pay the drop-letter rate. Only a handful of copies exist. In 1995, a used example of the two-cent blue sold for over \$2 million. They are prized not only for their rarity but also for their connection to the early history of Christian missions in the Pacific and the independent kingdom of Hawaii.



The world of valuable stamps is not limited to the famous "big five." Several other stamps command high prices and are deeply sought after by collectors.

- **The Penny Black (1840):** While not rare in absolute terms (over 68 million were printed), the world's first adhesive postage stamp remains a foundational piece for any serious collection. Fine used examples with clear, neat cancellations can command thousands of dollars.
- **The Basel Dove (1845):** Issued by the Swiss canton of Basel, this stamp features an embossed white dove carrying a letter. It is a beautifully designed stamp that is highly collectible and valuable.
- **The Sicilian Error of Color (1859):** This stamp features the head of King Victor Emmanuel II printed in a striking blue-violet on yellow paper. A rare color error, only a few copies are known.
- **China's "Whole Country is Red" Stamp (1968):** A rare modern error from the Cultural Revolution. The stamp features a map of China with the entire territory colored red. It was withdrawn almost immediately due to political sensitivities, making it one of the most valuable Chinese stamps.
