

Diet For Dog With Kidney Failure

Introduction

Phosphorus Restriction

failure. They are low in phosphorus and sodium, moderate in high-quality protein, and contain added omega-3s, B vitamins, and antioxidants. They are convenient and nutritionally complete. However, some dogs may be picky or need palatability enhancers (like warm water or low-sodium broth).

Homemade Diet Recipes

Some owners prefer to prepare fresh food. A homemade **diet for a dog with kidney failure** allows precise control over ingredients but requires veterinary nutritionist guidance to avoid deficiencies. A typical recipe might include:

- Cooked lean protein (e.g., skinless chicken breast, turkey, or white fish)
- Low-phosphorus carbohydrates (e.g., white rice, pasta, sweet potato in moderation)
- Egg whites (excellent protein source, low in phosphorus)
- Unsalted pumpkin or green beans (fiber and moisture)

Foods to Avoid

- High-sodium foods: processed meats, canned foods with added salt, commercial treats
- High-protein raw diets (unless modified for renal issues)
- Raisins, grapes, and certain toxic vegetables (onions, garlic – toxic regardless)

Foods to Include

Good additions to a **diet for a dog with kidney failure**:

- Cooked white fish (cod, haddock) – low in phosphorus
- Egg whites – nearly phosphorus-free protein
- Blueberries, apples (no seeds) – antioxidants
- Unsalted bone broth – flavor and hydration
- Pumpkin puree (plain) – fiber and moisture

Sample Meal Plan for a Dog with Kidney

Failure

Below is an example of a daily feeding plan for a 30-pound (14 kg) dog with chronic kidney disease. Always check with your veterinarian as needs vary by stage and individual.

1. **Breakfast:** 1 cup of commercial renal dry food (moistened with water) + 1 teaspoon of fish oil.
2. **Lunch:** 1/2 cup of homemade mix (cooked white fish + white rice + unsalted pumpkin).
3. **Dinner:** 1 cup of commercial renal wet food + 1 tablespoon of unsalted bone broth.
4. **Treats:** Small pieces of cooked sweet potato, blueberries, or commercial renal treats.

Ensure fresh water is always available. Some dogs may need multiple small meals to improve appetite.

Hydration and Kidney Health

Water is arguably the most important component of a **diet for a dog with kidney failure**. Dehydration worsens toxin buildup. Encourage drinking by:

- Adding water or low-sodium broth to meals
- Using a pet water fountain
- Feeding wet food (canned) – which has 75-80% moisture
- Offering ice chips as treats

In advanced stages, subcutaneous fluids may be necessary, but dietary hydration helps reduce that need.

Important Considerations and Monitoring

Transitioning to a new diet should be gradual over 7-10 days to avoid stomach upset. Monitor your dog's weight, appetite, and energy. Regular veterinary check-ups with blood work are essential to adjust the diet as kidney function changes. Key indicators to track include BUN, creatinine, phosphorus, and potassium levels.

Be aware that some dogs with kidney failure may develop metabolic acidosis or hyperkalemia (high potassium). Your vet may recommend alkalinizing agents or potassium binders. Never alter a **diet for a dog with kidney failure** without professional oversight, especially when using homemade recipes.

Also, remember that palatability is crucial. Many dogs lose their sense of
