Otitis Externa: Swimmer's Ear

Unlike otitis media, otitis externa is an infection of the outer ear canal, the passage leading from the eardrum to the outside of the head. It is commonly called swimmer's ear because it is often caused by water remaining in the ear after swimming, creating a moist environment where bacteria or fungi thrive. Symptoms include itching inside the ear, redness, drainage of clear or pus-like fluid, and significant pain when the outer

ear is touched or pulled. People with eczema, narrow ear canals, or those who use cotton swabs aggressively are at higher risk.

Meniere's Disease and Vertigo

Beyond infections, the ear is also the seat of our balance system. Meniere's disease is a disorder of the inner ear that causes spontaneous episodes of vertigo, a spinning sensation that can last from twenty minutes to several hours. These episodes are often accompanied by tinnitus, a ringing or roaring sound in the ear, and fluctuating hearing loss. While the

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exact cause is not fully understood, it is believed to involve abnormal fluid buildup in the inner ear. This disease can be debilitating and significantly impact a person's quality of life.

Tinnitus: The Phantom Sound

Tinnitus itself is not a disease but rather a symptom of an underlying condition, often related to the auditory system. It involves hearing sound when no external sound is present, commonly described as ringing, buzzing, hissing, or clicking. Causes range from age-related hearing loss and exposure

to loud noise to earwax blockage, certain medications, and cardiovascular disorders. While tinnitus can be highly distressing, it is rarely a sign of a serious medical problem, though it deserves attention when it persists.

Common Diseases Of The Nose

Chronic Rhinosinusitis

When nasal congestion, facial pressure, and reduced sense of smell last for twelve weeks or longer despite treatment, it is classified as chronic rhinosinusitis.

This condition involves prolonged inflammation of the sinuses, the air-filled cavities in the bones around the nose. It can be caused by infection, nasal polyps, or a deviated septum. Symptoms include thick nasal discharge, postnasal drip, headache, tooth pain, and fatigue. Chronic sinusitis is one of the most common chronic diseases in adults and can significantly affect daily functioning.

Allergic Rhinitis

Commonly known as hay fever, allergic rhinitis occurs when the immune system overreacts to airborne allergens such as pollen,

dust mites, pet dander, or mold. Symptoms include sneezing, runny or stuffy nose, itchy eyes and throat, and watery eyes. While not life-threatening, allergic rhinitis can lead to sleep disturbances, impaired concentration, and reduced productivity. It is also a major risk factor for developing asthma and sinusitis.

Nasal Polyps

Nasal polyps are soft, painless, non-cancerous growths that develop on the lining of the nasal passages or sinuses. They result from chronic inflammation and are often associated with asthma, allergies,

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recurrent infections, or aspirin sensitivity. When polyps become large or numerous, they can block nasal passages, leading to breathing difficulties, loss of smell, and recurrent sinus infections. Treatment typically involves corticosteroid sprays or, in severe cases, surgical removal.

Deviated Nasal Septum

The nasal septum is the wall of cartilage and bone that divides the nasal cavity into two nostrils. When this wall is displaced to one side, it is called a deviated septum. This condition is often present at birth or can result from an injury. A

significant deviation can cause difficulty breathing through one or both nostrils, recurrent nosebleeds, snoring, and recurrent sinus infections. While many people have some degree of septal deviation without symptoms, those with severe deviation may benefit from surgical correction called septoplasty.

Common Diseases Of The Throat

Pharyngitis and Tonsillitis

Pharyngitis, commonly known as a sore throat, is inflammation of the

pharynx, the part of the throat behind the mouth and nasal cavity. It is most often caused by viral infections like the common cold or flu, but bacterial infections such as streptococcus can also be responsible. When the inflammation specifically affects the tonsils, it is called tonsillitis. Symptoms include a scratchy or painful throat, difficulty swallowing, red and swollen tonsils, white patches on the tonsils, fever, and swollen lymph nodes. Recurrent tonsillitis may require surgical removal of the tonsils, a procedure called tonsillectomy.

Laryngitis

Laryngitis is inflammation of the larynx, or voice box, which contains the vocal cords. It is usually caused by overuse of the voice, viral infections, or irritation from smoke or allergens. The hallmark symptom is hoarseness or complete loss of voice. Other symptoms include a dry cough, a tickling sensation in the throat, and a raw feeling. Most cases resolve with rest and hydration, but chronic laryngitis lasting more than three weeks may signal an underlying issue such as acid reflux, vocal cord nodules, or even cancer.

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Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease and Laryngopharyngeal Reflux

Gastroesophageal reflux disease occurs when stomach acid frequently flows back into the esophagus. When this acid reaches the throat and larynx, it is called laryngopharyngeal reflux, often referred to as silent reflux because it does not always cause heartburn. Symptoms include chronic cough, a sensation of a lump in the throat, hoarseness, frequent throat clearing, and difficulty swallowing. This condition is increasingly recognized as a major cause of

chronic laryngitis and can contribute to other ENT diseases if left untreated.

Obstructive Sleep Apnea

Obstructive sleep apnea is a serious sleep disorder in which the throat muscles relax excessively during sleep, causing the airway to narrow or close completely. This results in repeated pauses in breathing, loud snoring, gasping for air during sleep, and excessive daytime sleepiness. The condition is strongly linked to obesity, large tonsils, a large tongue, or a narrow airway. Untreated sleep apnea increases the risk of high blood

pressure, heart disease, stroke, and type 2 diabetes. Continuous positive airway pressure therapy is the standard treatment, though surgery may be considered in certain cases.

When To See An ENT Specialist

While many mild ENT conditions resolve on their own or with basic home care, certain warning signs warrant a visit to an otolaryngologist, commonly known as an ENT doctor. You should consider seeking professional evaluation if you experience any of

the following:

- Hearing loss that comes on suddenly or persists
- Chronic ear infections that do not respond to treatment
- Dizziness or vertigo that interferes with daily activities
- Persistent ringing in the ears
- Recurrent sinus infections or nasal congestion lasting more than twelve weeks
- Loss of smell that does not improve
- A sore throat that lasts longer than a week
- Hoarseness persisting for more than three weeks
- Difficulty swallowing or a

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sensation of a lump in the throat

- Loud snoring with observed pauses in breathing during sleep
