- **Red (Operations, Engineering & Security):** The infamous red shirt. This division included engineers, security personnel, and operations officers. In the original series, security officers wearing red often found themselves on hazardous landing parties, leading to the "redshirt" trope denoting an expendable character.

The Next Generation (TNG) Era: The Gold Standard Shifts

When *Star Trek: The Next Generation* debuted in 1987, the uniforms underwent a major redesign

while retaining the three-division structure. However, a key color swap was introduced, which is why any thorough **Star Trek Uniform Color Guide** must highlight this change.

- **Red (Command):** The most significant change. Red moved from the lowest-risk operations role to the highest authority. Captain Jean-Luc Picard, Commander William Riker, and all bridge command officers wore red. This instantly conveyed leadership and authority.
- **Gold (Operations & Engineering):** Gold was reassigned to the operations division. Chief Engineer Geordi La Forge and Transporter Chief Miles O'Brien wore this color. It also encompassed Security, though that later branched into a distinct yellow hue in the movies. This is where the mechanical and technical heart of the ship resided.
- **Blue (Science & Medical):** Blue remained consistent with the original series. Counselor Deanna Troi, Chief Medical Officer Beverly Crusher, and Data (who identified as an android science officer) all wore blue. The color continued to symbolize intellect, healing, and research.

Deep Space Nine (DS9) and Voyager: Variations on a Theme

The subsequent series of the 1990s, set in the same timeline as TNG, used the TNG color palette but introduced new uniform designs. This period also introduced more nuanced ranks and specialty insignias.

The Deep Space Nine and First Contact Uniforms

Initially, DS9 used the standard TNG uniforms. However, in its third season (and the movie *First Contact*), Starfleet introduced a new "duty uniform" with a grey shoulders and a colored undershirt.

- **Red Undershirt:** Still command. Captain Sisko wore this.
- **Gold Undershirt:** Still operations. Chief O'Brien and Captain Nog (later in life) wore this.
- **Blue Undershirt:** Still science/medical. Doctor Bashir and Jadzia Dax wore this.

Voyager's Integrated Look

USS *Voyager* initially used the same duty uniforms, but due to its isolation in the Delta Quadrant, the crew adopted a more practical, comfortable tunic style. However, the color code remained absolutely consistent with the TNG standard.

- Captain Janeway wore **Red**.
- Chief Engineer Torres and Security Officer Tuvok wore **Gold**.
- Doctor (EMH) and Kes wore **Blue**.

Enterprise (ENT): A Pre-Federation Anomaly

Star Trek: Enterprise served as a prequel, taking place a century before Kirk. As such, the uniform color system was entirely different, reflecting a less mature Starfleet. This period is a unique entry in any **Star Trek Uniform Color Guide** because it breaks the three-color mold.

- **Blue/Grey (All Departments):** The primary uniform was a one-piece blue or grey

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jumpsuit with a colored shoulder strap and piping.

- **Departmental Colors:**

- **Gold/Orange:** Command. Captain Archer wore this.
- **Blue:** Science. T'Pol wore this.
- **Red:** Engineering/Security. Trip Tucker and Malcolm Reed wore this.

This system was a precursor to the later, more rigid TOS model.

The Kelvin Timeline: A Modern Retro-Future

The J.J. Abrams films (2009-2016) created an alternate timeline. The uniforms were a sleek, modernized homage to the original series, combining TOS colors with modern tailoring.

- **Gold (Command & Helm):** Captain Kirk and Lieutenant Hikaru Sulu wore gold.
- **Blue (Science & Medical):** Spock and Dr. McCoy wore blue.
- **Red (Engineering & Security):** Scotty and security officers wore red.

This reversion to the TOS standard was a deliberate visual cue to signal the timeline's connection to the original adventure.

Discovery and Strange New Worlds: The 32nd Century and Beyond

The modern era of *Star Trek* has brought the most significant evolution yet. *Discovery* originally used blue/grey uniforms (TOS style) before jumping to the far future, where the uniform system became flexible and individualized. *Strange New Worlds*, set just before TOS, uses the TOS color logic but with a more refined, modern cut.

- **Strange New Worlds:** Gold (Pike), Red (Ortega - Helm), Blue (Spock).
- **Discovery (32nd Century):** The uniform code relaxed. While a chain of command exists, distinct division colors are less rigid, with characters wearing more personalized attire, though the classic colors appear on badges and piping.

Beyond the Division: What the Colors Symbolize

- **Security: Gold or Red?** In TNG, Security was gold, but in the movies, they had a distinct yellow/gold. In DS9, security was gold. In TOS, it was red. The color of security has been the most fluid, often depending on the uniform design.
- **The "Red Shirt" Curse:** The trope of the doomed security officer wearing red in TOS was so powerful that it became a cultural phenomenon. Subsequent series deliberately subverted this by making red the color of command.
