3. **Mouth:** From the bottom of the nose, draw a short line downward, then split it into two curved lines going left and right. This creates the classic rabbit mouth.
4. **Cheeks:** Add two small curved lines below the eyes to suggest fluffy cheeks.
5. **Whiskers:** Draw three or four thin lines extending outward from each cheek. Make them light and delicate.

Step 4: Draw the Body and Legs

Now you connect the head to the body and add the limbs.

1. **Front Legs:** From the bottom of the head oval, draw two cylinders extending downward. Rabbits often tuck their front paws under their chest. Add small ovals at the end for the paws.
