- **Italy:** Originally a member of the Triple Alliance, Italy switched sides in 1915, joining the Allies after secret treaties promised them Austrian territory. They fought mainly against Austria-Hungary in the Alps.
- **United States of America:** Remained neutral until 1917, entering the war on the side of the Allies after Germany's unrestricted submarine warfare and the Zimmerman Telegram. The US provided fresh troops and immense economic power.
- **Other crucial allies:** **Serbia** (the target of the initial Austrian attack), **Belgium** (whose neutrality was violated), **Japan** (seized German colonies in Asia), **Romania** (joined the Allies in 1916), and **Greece** (joined in 1917).

So, when understanding **who was fighting who in World War 1**, the Allied Powers represent a broad coalition that grew to include nations from every continent, united in their opposition to the Central Powers.

Germany felt encircled by France to the west and Russia to the east. The British feared German naval expansion threatening its global empire. The Alliance System Itself

The network of treaties meant that a local conflict—the assassination in Sarajevo—could rapidly escalate. When Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia with German backing, Russia mobilised in defence of Serbia. This triggered Germany's declaration of war on Russia, and then on France (Russia's ally). The German invasion of Belgium brought Britain into the war. Each nation's decision pulled its allies in. - Russia:** Left the war in 1917 after the Bolshevik Revolution, signing a separate peace with the Central Powers (the Treaty of Brest-Litovsk) in early 1918. This dramatically changed the balance of power but came too late to save the Central Powers.
