With 115 minutes for roughly 41 questions, you have an average of about two and a half minutes per question. This sounds generous, but some problems will take longer to read and solve, while others can be answered in under a minute. A good strategy is to move through the test methodically, answering the questions you are confident about first and marking more challenging ones to return to later. Do not get stuck on a single problem; every question is worth the same number of points, so it is better to answer five easier questions than to spend excessive time on one

difficult one and miss others.
