This translation captures the essence of the original Greek while offering a cadence that is both poetic and accessible. The phrase **1 Corinthians 13 4 8 Espanol** directs readers to this specific section, which serves as the emotional and theological heart of the entire chapter.

Why the Spanish Translation Matters
