

Biography Of Pope Francis Jorge Mario Bergoglio

In 1958, he entered the novitiate of the Society of Jesus, the Jesuits, thus beginning a journey that would shape both his character and his

leadership style.

Jesuit Formation and Early Priesthood

The Society of Jesus is known for its intellectual rigor, commitment to education, and emphasis on social justice. Bergoglio thrived in this environment. He studied humanities in Chile, then returned to Argentina to study philosophy and theology. He was ordained a priest on December 13, 1969, at the age of 32. His early assignments included teaching literature and psychology at Jesuit colleges, and he served as the master of novices and later as rector of the Jesuit seminary in San Miguel.

One of the most formative aspects of his Jesuit training was his exposure to liberation theology, a movement that emerged in Latin America in the 1960s and 1970s. Liberation theology emphasized reading the Gospel through the eyes of the poor and working for structural change. While Bergoglio was never a full adherent of the movement—some of its Marxist leanings troubled him—he absorbed its core commitment to the marginalized. This would later define his papacy.

Provincial Superior During Argentina's Dirty War

From 1973 to 1979, Bergoglio served as the provincial superior of the Jesuits in Argentina, a tumultuous period marked by the military dictatorship's Dirty War. During this time, thousands of people were kidnapped, tortured, and killed. Bergoglio's role during these years has been the subject of controversy and scrutiny. Some have accused him

of not doing enough to protect Jesuit priests who were targeted by the regime. Others defend his actions, citing evidence that he secretly helped many people escape persecution by hiding them or facilitating their departure from the country. In 2013, a biography titled *The Jesuit* by journalist Francesca Ambrogetti detailed his behind-the-scenes efforts. Bergoglio himself has acknowledged the complexity of that era, stating that he acted prudently to save lives without risking the entire Jesuit order. Archbishop of Buenos Aires and Cardinal

After serving in various leadership roles within the Jesuits, Bergoglio was appointed auxiliary bishop of Buenos Aires in 1992, then coadjutor archbishop in 1997, and finally archbishop of Buenos Aires in 1998. He became a cardinal in 2001 under Pope John Paul II. As archbishop, he was known for his austere lifestyle: he chose to live in a simple apartment rather than the archbishop's palace, cooked his own meals, and used public transportation. He often visited the slums (villas miserias) surrounding the city, where he celebrated Mass and offered pastoral care. His approachability and humility won him the affection of many, although he was also criticized by progressive Catholics for his conservative stance on issues like abortion and same-sex marriage.

During the 2005 papal conclave, Bergoglio was reportedly the runner-up to Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger (Pope Benedict XVI). Many believed he would have been elected if he had been willing to accept. Eight years

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later, with Benedict's unprecedented resignation, the cardinals turned to Bergoglio, who initially hesitated but eventually accepted the call. approach to divorced and remarried Catholics; LGBTQ individuals, and those on the margins.

The Papacy: Choosing the Name Francis

Immediately after his election, Pope Francis made history by choosing the name Francis—the first pope to do so. He explained that Saint Francis of Assisi was “the man of poverty, the man of peace, the man who loves and protects creation.” This choice set the tone for a papacy that would prioritize the poor, peace, and environmental stewardship.

His first public appearances were marked by spontaneity and humility. He asked the crowd to pray for him before giving his blessing, he paid his own bill at the hotel where he had been staying, and he refused many of the traditional papal trappings, such as the red shoes and the gold cross. Instead, he wore simple white vestments and carried a plain iron cross. These gestures resonated globally and signaled a break from the pomp of the Vatican.

Major Themes of the Pontificate

1. A Church for the Poor

Pope Francis has consistently called for a “poor church for the poor.” In his apostolic exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* (The Joy of the Gospel), he urged the church to move out of its comfort zones and go to the peripheries—geographic, social, and existential. He instituted a “World Day of the Poor” and often invites homeless people to have lunch with him. His emphasis on mercy over doctrine has led to a more pastoral

2. Environmental Advocacy

In 2015, the pope released his landmark encyclical *Laudato Si'* (Praise Be to You), subtitled “On Care for Our Common Home.” This document addressed the ecological crisis, linking environmental degradation to social injustice and calling for an “integral ecology.” The encyclical was widely praised by scientists and activists and positioned the Catholic Church as a leading voice on climate change. Pope Francis continued this theme in his 2023 follow-up, *Laudate Deum*, which urged world leaders to take concrete action.

3. Interfaith Dialogue and Peacebuilding

From the start, Pope Francis has actively engaged with leaders of other religions. He visited the Grand Imam of Al-Azhar in Egypt, signed a document on “Human Fraternity” with the sheikh, and has hosted numerous interfaith gatherings. He also played a pivotal role in helping to restore diplomatic relations between the United States and Cuba in 2014. His peace efforts extend to conflict zones; he has repeatedly called for an end to wars in Syria, Ukraine, and the Holy Land.

4. Reform of the Roman Curia

One of the most challenging internal tasks Pope Francis undertook was reforming the Vatican bureaucracy. He established a council of cardinal advisors (the C9), enacted financial transparency measures, and restructured several departments. His commitment to synodality—a more participatory and listening church—has reshaped

how the church makes decisions, culminating in the ongoing Synod on Synodality, which includes laypeople and women in deliberative roles.

Challenges and Controversies

His papacy has faced significant opposition from conservative Catholics who feel he has diluted doctrine on marriage and the Eucharist. Despite this, he continues to travel and engage with global issues. He has visited countries as diverse as Iraq, Myanmar, and Mongolia, often venturing to places others avoid. His trip to Iraq in 2021 was historic,

as it was the first papal visit to the country and included a meeting with Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani, a major interfaith milestone.

As he approaches his tenth anniversary as pope in 2023, his legacy is already being assessed. He has fundamentally changed the tone of the papacy, prioritizing mercy and joy over rigid rules. He has opened doors to those previously excluded, advocated for migrants and refugees with unwavering passion, and challenged the global economic system that creates inequality. His impact extends well beyond the Catholic Church, influencing world leaders, environmentalists, and ordinary people seeking a more compassionate world.
