Selection Tools Mastery

- **Marquee Tools (M):** Rectangular and elliptical selections. Hold Shift to constrain proportions.
- **Lasso Tools (L):** Freehand, Polygonal, and Magnetic Lasso for irregular shapes. The Magnetic Lasso snaps to edges automatically.
- **Magic Wand (W):** Selects areas of similar color. Adjust the Tolerance value (0-255) in the Options bar to control sensitivity.

Working with Layers: The Backbone of Photoshop 7

Layers and the Layers Palette

Before Photoshop 7, layers existed but were less refined. The **Layers Palette** (F7) shows each element of your composition stacked vertically. You can create new layers (Layer > New > Layer or Shift+Ctrl+N), delete them (drag to trash icon), and reorder them by dragging. Every pixel-based operation affects only the active layer. This non-destructive approach is why layers are essential in any **Photoshop 7 tutorial**.

Layer Blending Modes and Opacity

One of the most powerful features is the ability to change how layers interact. The dropdown menu in the Layers

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palette lists blending modes such as **Multiply** (darkens), **Screen** (lightens), **Overlay**, and **Soft Light**. Experiment with these on duplicate layers to create dramatic effects. Adjust **Opacity** (0-100%) to control transparency. Layer Masks: Non-Destructive Editing

Adding and Formatting Text

These are non-destructive layer styles that remain editable. In the Layer Style dialog box, adjust angle, distance, size, and opacity. Combine a drop shadow with a subtle bevel to give your text a 3D appearance. For a glowing effect, use **Outer Glow**. Because Photoshop 7 does not have live preview in the same way, you can click

Photo Retouching Techniques That Stand the Test of Time

Healing Brush and Clone Stamp

Adjustment Layers for Color Correction

Instead of directly altering a layer, use **Layer > New Adjustment Layer**. Options include **Levels**, **Curves**, **Hue/Saturation**, and **Brightness/Contrast**. Each adjustment layer comes with a built-in mask, allowing you to apply corrections selectively. Mastering Curves will give you fine control over tonal range. essential.

Sharpening and Noise Reduction

Apply **Unsharp Mask** (Filter > Sharpen > Unsharp Mask) to bring out detail in your images. Use a small radius (0.5-1.0 pixels) and an amount between 50% and 150% to avoid halos. For reducing noise, Photoshop 7 lacks the dedicated Noise Reduction filter of later versions, but you can use **Filter > Blur > Gaussian Blur** on a duplicate layer and then mask out the areas you want to keep sharp.

Saving and Exporting Your Work

PSD Format for Continued Editing

Always save your working file as a **Photoshop PSD** (File > Save As) to preserve layers, masks, and adjustment layers. This is your master file. For sharing or printing, you can flatten the image (Layer > Flatten Image) and then save as JPEG, TIFF, or PNG.

Optimizing for Web

Photoshop 7 includes the **Save for Web** feature (File > Save for Web). This dialog allows you to compare different compression settings side by side. Choose JPEG for photographs (quality 50-80 is usually sufficient), PNG-8 for graphics with solid colors, and GIF for simple animations. This is a crucial step in any

Advanced Tools and Workflow Tips

Actions and Batch Processing

To automate repetitive tasks, record an **Action** using the Actions palette (Window > Actions). Click the **New Action** icon, perform a sequence of steps (e.g., resize, sharpen, save as JPEG), then stop recording. You can apply this action to multiple files using **File > Automate > Batch**. This feature alone can save hours of manual work.

Filters and Plugins
