This series adapts the early chapters of the manga, focusing on Yugi Mutou solving ancient puzzles and facing off against villains using various games rather than solely the dueling mechanics we know today. However, this version is shorter (27 episodes) and rarely broadcast internationally.

The series that most fans consider the true start of the **Yu Gi Oh series in order** is **Yu-Gi-Oh! Duel Monsters** (2000). Produced by Studio Gallop, this is the version that introduced the world to the Duel Monsters card game, the Pharaoh's spirit, and characters like Seto Kaiba and Joey Wheeler. Spanning 224 episodes, it covers the Duelist Kingdom, Battle City, and the Millennium World arcs. For viewers who want a streamlined experience, starting with Duel Monsters is the best way to understand the core lore of the franchise. This series establishes the rules of the card game and the emotional stakes that would carry through every subsequent entry in the **Yu Gi Oh series in order**.

2. Yu-Gi-Oh! GX (2004): The Next Generation

After the original series concluded, the franchise introduced a new protagonist in a new setting. **Yu-Gi-Oh! GX** (also known as Yu-Gi-Oh! Duel Monsters GX) takes place several years after the events of Duel Monsters. The story follows **Jaden Yuki** (Judai Yuki in Japan), a carefree duelist enrolled at the Duel Academy, a school dedicated to the card game. The series also features returning characters like Seto Kaiba in minor roles, but it largely builds its own mythos around "Sacred Beasts" and other dimensions. When listing the **Yu Gi Oh series in order**, GX is number two, and it runs for 180 episodes across three seasons. It is a must-watch for fans who enjoy character growth and a more gradual build-up from comedy to high-stakes dueling.

3. Yu-Gi-Oh! 5D's (2008): Turbo Duels and a Darker Future

The third major series in the **Yu Gi Oh series in order** is **Yu-Gi-Oh! 5D's**, which aired from 2008 to 2011. Set in a futuristic Domino City called "New Domino City," the series introduces a new summoning mechanic: **Synchro Summoning**. The protagonist, **Yusei Fudo**, is a skilled duelist from the Satellite district who competes in "Turbo Duels" on high-speed motorcycles known as Duel Runners. The darker, dystopian atmosphere of 5D's is a stark contrast to GX's academy setting.

The story delves into themes of social inequality, destiny, and the bonds between duelists and their monsters. The introduction of the "Signers" and the "Crimson Dragon" adds a mythological layer that harkens back to the original series without directly retreading Egyptian lore. With 154 episodes, 5D's often ranks among the most mature and well-plotted entries. For fans who enjoy racing, intense duels, and a serious narrative, 5D's is a highlight of the **Yu Gi Oh series in order**.

4. Yu-Gi-Oh! Zexal (2011): A New Beginning with Numbers

Following 5D's, the franchise took a more youthful approach with **Yu-Gi-Oh! Zexal**, which began airing in 2011. The series introduces **Yuma Tsukumo**, an energetic but inexperienced duelist, and his alien partner **Astral**. Together, they collect the legendary "Number" cards to restore Astral's memory and save both worlds. Zexal introduces **Xyz Summoning** (pronounced "Exceed"), a new mechanic that became a staple of the trading card game.

The first part of Zexal (73 episodes) focuses on collecting the Numbers, while the second part, **Yu-Gi-Oh! Zexal II** (73 episodes), ramps up the stakes with the Barian World invasion. Although Zexal has a slower start and a younger target audience, it develops a strong emotional core and memorable antagonists like Kite Tenjo. In the chronology of the **Yu Gi Oh series in order**, Zexal is the fourth main series, and it stands out for its colorful art style and focus on friendship above all else.

5. Yu-Gi-Oh! Arc-V (2014): Dimension-Hopping Dueling

With **Yu-Gi-Oh! Arc-V**, the franchise celebrated its 20th anniversary by bringing together elements from all

previous series. Airing from 2014 to 2017, Arc-V centers on **Yuya Sakaki**, a duelist who uses the new **Pendulum Summoning** mechanic. The story takes place in the "Standard Dimension," but soon expands to the "Synchro," "Xyz," and "Fusion" dimensions, each reflecting the summoning methods of past series.

Arc-V is notable for its massive crossover appeal. Characters resembling Yusei, Jaden, and even Yugi appear as counterparts from other dimensions. The series runs for 148 episodes and explores themes of entertainment, unity, and the consequences of war. While its final arc received mixed reactions from fans, it remains a crucial part of the **Yu Gi Oh series in order** because it celebrates the entire franchise. The Pendulum Summoning mechanic also added a new layer of strategy to the card game, making this series particularly interesting for players.

6. Yu-Gi-Oh! VRAINS (2017): Cyberspace and Virtual Reality

The sixth main series, **Yu-Gi-Oh! VRAINS**, premiered in 2017 and concluded in 2019 with 120 episodes. Set in a world where the card game is played largely in a virtual reality network called LINK VRAINS, the series introduces **Link Summoning** (often called "Master Rule 4" in the real game). The protagonist, **Yusaku Fujiki**, is a loner who uses his hacking skills and the cyberse deck to defeat the malicious AI known as the "Ignis."

VRAINS has a darker, more serious tone similar to 5D's but with a heavier focus on technology and digital threats. The duels are fast-paced, and the character development of Yusaku and his partner Ai is a highlight. In the order of the **Yu Gi Oh series in order**, VRAINS represents a return to a more intense storyline with global consequences. It is also the last series to follow the classic format of the card game before the franchise made a narrative shift with the next entry.

7. Yu-Gi-Oh! Sevens (2020): A New Era with Rush Duels

To mark a new generation of players and anime viewers, **Yu-Gi-Oh! Sevens** launched in 2020 as a soft reboot of the franchise. The story follows **Yuga Ohdo**, a young duelist who invents **Rush Dueling**, a simplified version of the card game with faster rules. The anime is produced by Bridge, a different studio from the previous series, and it takes place in a completely separate universe from the earlier Yu-Gi-Oh! timelines.

Sevens is a deliberate departure from the established **Yu Gi Oh series in order** in terms of storytelling. It has a lighter, more comedic tone, with episodes often focusing on school life and the creation of the duel disk. The series runs for 92 episodes, and it is followed by its sequel, Yu-Gi-Oh! Go Rush!!. For longtime fans, Sevens may feel like

a different show entirely, but it successfully introduces the franchise to younger audiences. It is still part of the official timeline of the **Yu Gi Oh series in order** as the seventh major anime installment.

8. Yu-Gi-Oh! Go Rush!! (2022): The Sequel to Sevens

The most recent series as of 2024 is **Yu-Gi-Oh! Go Rush!!**, which began airing in 2022 and continues the Rush Dueling format established in Sevens. The protagonist is **Yudias Velgear**, an alien who arrives on Earth and partners with twin siblings Yuamu and Yuhi Ohdo. This series expands on the Rush Dueling system while maintaining the comedic, fast-paced style of Sevens.

Go Rush!! also includes deeper lore about aliens and the origins of the card game, though it remains disconnected from the original continuity. With over 100 episodes aired and still ongoing, it represents the current state of the franchise. However, note that Sevens and Go Rush!! are entirely separate universes, so you can skip them if you prefer the original continuity. Alternatively, you could watch each series independently, as they are largely self-contained. The only exceptions are the movies, which you should watch after completing the respective series. For example,
