But with rough openings, you add king and jack studs. A more precise method:

$\text{total length minus openings} = 14 \text{ ft} - 3 \text{ ft} - 3 \text{ ft} - 3 \text{ ft} = 5 \text{ ft solid segments. For 5 ft, studs needed} = (60 \text{ in} / 16 \text{ in}) + 1 = 4.75$, round to 5. Plus the cripples around openings: each window needs 2 cripples above and below (4 per window, total 8) plus door 4 = 12. So total = $5 + 12 = 17$. However, many exam questions simplify. Expect to multiply and adjust.

- Question:** What is the total rise of a staircase with 14 risers, each 7 inches high, and a total run of 10 feet?

Answer: Total rise = number of risers $\times$ riser height = $14 \times 7 \text{ in} = 98 \text{ inches}$ (8 ft 2 in). The run is for the treads only: 13 treads $\times$? (usually 10-11 in). But the question asks only rise. So answer: 98 inches.

- Question:** Which type of saw is best for cutting a curved line in plywood?

Answer: A jigsaw (saber saw) is most appropriate because of its narrow blade and ability to follow curves.

- Question:** When installing a load-bearing header above a window, the header must be supported by what type of studs?

Answer: Jack studs (also called trimmer studs) support the header. King studs run full height on either side.

These examples illustrate the blend of math, code, and practical knowledge you need. The more you practice **journeyman carpenter test questions**, the more comfortable you will become with the exam format.
