- Bloody** – This word is far more common in British English than American English. It is used as an intensifier, often expressing annoyance. "That's a bloody nuisance!"
Telugu Meaning (దూర్మగాపు వాడుక): There is no direct equivalent, but "దూర్మగాపు" (Durmargapu) or simply using "చాలా" (Chala - very) with a negative tone can convey a similar feeling.
- Crap** – A mild substitute for a stronger word for feces. It is used to mean "nonsense" or "something of poor quality." "This movie is crap."
Telugu Meaning (చెస్థ వాడుక): "అర్థం లేని మాటలు" (ardham leni matalu) or "చెస్థ" (Chestha - trash/rubbish). In a stronger sense, it can be compared to "పీ" (Pee), though that is more vulgar.
- Damn it / Darn it** – A common exclamation of frustration. "Darn it, I missed the bus!"
Telugu Meaning (చీ వాడుక): "చీ!" (Chee!) or "ఐయ్యో!" (Aiyyo!). These are natural, mild expressions of disappointment.

Moderate English Bad Words and Their Telugu Equivalents

These words carry more sting. They are often directed at someone and can cause real offense. They should be used with caution, if at all.

- Bastard** – A highly insulting term. Historically, it meant an illegitimate child, but today it is used broadly to mean a despicable or unpleasant person. "That bastard stole my wallet."

Strong English Bad Words and Their Telugu Equivalents
