Code: SPN 3719 / FMI 9

Diesel Exhaust Fluid (DEF) quality issue. The system has detected that the DEF concentration is outside the acceptable range, or that the fluid is contaminated. This code often leads to derated engine power until the issue is resolved.

Code: SPN 4117 / FMI 16

Diesel Particulate Filter (DPF) regeneration required. This code indicates that the soot load in the DPF has reached a level requiring active regeneration. If ignored, the filter can become clogged, leading to reduced fuel economy and potential engine shutdown.

Transmission and Drivetrain Fault Codes

Code: SPN 520 / FMI 2

Transmission oil temperature high. This can occur during heavy loads, extended idling, or low transmission fluid levels. Shifting to a lower gear or reducing load may help, but a persistent code should be investigated for mechanical issues.

Code: SPN 1681 / FMI 4

Traction control system malfunction. This indicates an issue with the wheel speed sensors or the traction control module. While the vehicle may still be driveable, stability in adverse conditions could be compromised.
