

How To Draw Patrick Star

What You'll Need Before You Begin

Before you dive into how to draw Patrick Star step by step, it helps to have the right tools on hand. Don't worry—you won't need fancy art supplies. Here's a simple

list:

- **Paper:** Any clean sheet of drawing paper or sketchbook.
- **Pencil:** A standard HB or mechanical pencil for sketching.
- **Eraser:** A soft vinyl or kneaded eraser works best.
- **Black marker or pen:** For inking the final outlines.
- **Colored pencils, crayons, or markers:** Pink, green, purple, blue, and yellow for coloring Patrick's details.

Optional items include a ruler if you like straight guidelines (though Patrick is wobbly on purpose) and a reference image of Patrick Star. Once you have everything ready, you can move to the first step with confidence.

Step 1: Draw the Basic Body Shape

Every amazing drawing starts with a foundation. For Patrick Star, his body is essentially a lumpy star shape. But unlike a perfect five-pointed star, Patrick's form is more organic—like a chubby, rounded starfish.

1. Lightly sketch a large oval or rounded diamond shape in the center of your paper. This will be Patrick's torso. Don't worry about precision; the more irregular, the better.
2. From the top of the oval, draw a short, curved line upward to form the top arm. Then add two more

arms on the sides—these should be stubby and rounded at the ends.

3. At the bottom, sketch two short “legs” that are just small rounded bumps. Patrick doesn’t have distinct feet, just wide bottom points.
4. Connect all the arms to the main body with smooth curves. The overall shape should look like a fat starfish that’s been sitting too long in the sun.

Take your time with this step because the body shape sets the stage for everything else. If it looks a bit wonky, that’s perfect—Patrick is not meant to be symmetrical.

Step 2: Add the Eyes and Eyebrows

Patrick’s eyes are large, expressive, and one of the most recognizable features. To convey his sweet, simple personality, follow these sub-steps:

Draw the Eye Sockets

Inside the upper part of the body oval, sketch two large, slanted ovals that tilt inward toward the center. Think of them as “angry” or “surprised” eyes. They should be roughly the same size and positioned about one finger-width apart.

Create the Pupils and Irises

Inside each eye socket, draw a smaller circle for the iris, and inside that, a tiny black circle for the pupil. Color the pupil solid black, leaving a small white dot for the reflection (that little spark makes Patrick look alive). The irises are usually yellow-green, but we’ll color later.

Add the Famous Eyebrows

Just above the eyes, draw two thick,

horizontal lines for eyebrows. They don’t curve much; they’re more like rectangular blocks. If you want a happy expression, keep them slightly angled upward at the inner corners.

Step 3: Sketch the Nose and Mouth

Patrick’s face is dominated by his nose and mouth, which together create his classic goofy grin.

- **Nose:** Draw a long, curved line that starts between the eyes and curves downward to the left (or right, depending on which direction you want him facing). The nose is basically a long, hooked shape, like a flattened “S.” Add a small oval at the end of the line to form the nostril.
- **Mouth:** Below the nose, draw a wide, open smile. Start from one side of the face and curve downward, then back up to the other side. Inside the smile, add a few small rectangles for teeth—Patrick often shows his top teeth. Then draw a curved line for the lower lip.
- **Cheek marks:** On the cheeks, add two small curved lines that look like dimples. This emphasizes his friendly, childlike expression.

Take a moment to check that the face looks balanced. Patrick’s eyes should be large, and his mouth should take up a good portion of the lower face. The overall effect is a character who is both funny and endearing.

Step 4: Draw the Belly and Starfish Patterns

Now we add the details that make Patrick unmistakably a starfish.

How To Draw Patrick Star

1. **Belly line:** Draw a curved line across the midsection of the body, from one side to the other. This line should be slightly lower than the bottom of the eyes. It marks the separation between Patrick's upper body and his belly.
2. **Belly button:** At the center of that line, draw a small circle or oval. Patrick's belly button is usually drawn as a simple dot or tiny ring.
3. **Starfish bumps:** Along the edges of each arm and leg, add small, irregular bumps or spikes. These are the "starfish texture" that makes him look like he's made of squishy rubber. Don't overdo it—just a few per arm.
4. **Spots:** Patrick often has a few darker spots on his body, especially on his head and arms. Draw two or three small circles or ovals randomly placed. These are part of his starfish pattern.

Step 5: Draw the Shorts and Accessories

Patrick wears a pair of green shorts with purple flowers. This is a key step in how to draw Patrick Star step by step, because his outfit adds a lot of personality.

Outline the Shorts

Starting below the belly line, sketch a curved rectangle that wraps around the lower body. The shorts should cover about one-third of his total height. The bottom edge should be wavy, not straight, to show fabric folds.

Add the Belt and Pattern

Draw a thin belt across the top of the shorts. Then add a belt buckle in the center—just a small square. Below the

belt, sketch two or three simple flower shapes. Each flower can be a circle with five tiny petals around it, colored purple later.

The Two Front Pockets

Patrick usually has two rectangular pockets on the front of his shorts. Draw them as small patches with a curved opening line.

Once the shorts are done, you can also add his iconic "shirt" – but actually Patrick doesn't wear a shirt. However, many versions include a simple neckline or a clam necklace. Feel free to leave it out for a classic look, or add a small shell necklace if you want.

Step 6: Add the Final Details - Fingers, Toes, and Texture

Patrick's hands and feet are simple, but they give him movement and charm.

- **Fingers:** At the end of each arm, draw two or three short, stubby lines for fingers. They don't need to be perfect—just think of small sausages.
- **Toes:** At the bottom of each leg bump, add two tiny ovals for toes. Patrick has three toes on each foot? Actually, in most designs, he has two large toes. Check your reference, but two is standard.
- **Extra texture lines:** Add a few faint curved lines on the arms and head to suggest the natural creases of a starfish. These should be very light so they don't overwhelm the drawing.
- **Eyelashes:** Patrick doesn't usually have eyelashes, but if you want a cuter version, you can add a few tiny

lines at the outer corners of the eyes.

Step 7: Ink and Erase Guidelines

Now it's time to make your sketch permanent. Using a black marker, fine-liner pen, or dark pencil, carefully trace over the final lines you want to keep. Start with the eyes and mouth—these are the most important. Then move to the body outline, shorts, and details.

1. Go slowly to avoid mistakes. If you mess up, don't worry—you can always incorporate it into the character's wacky style.
2. After the ink dries (if using a pen), gently erase all the pencil guidelines. This will leave you with a clean, crisp line art drawing.
3. If you used a pencil for inking, you can darken the lines by pressing harder, then erase surrounding sketch marks.

Step 8: Color Your Patrick Star

Coloring is where Patrick truly comes to life. The official colors are very specific, so follow this palette:

- **Body:** Light pink (almost salmon). Use a pink base and a slightly darker pink for shading around the edges.
- **Eyes:** Yellow-green for the irises. The pupils remain black.
- **Shorts:** Forest green for the base, with a lighter green for highlights.
- **Flowers on shorts:** Purple petals with a yellow center.
- **Belly button and spots:** Darker pink or even light brown.
- **Teeth:** White, but you can add a tiny bit of light blue shadow.

If you're using colored pencils, layer the colors gently. Start with a light base, then add shadows on one side (where the light isn't hitting). For a more cartoonish look, use markers for bold, even colors. Remember to color the background if you want a complete scene—perhaps a sandy floor or a blue sky.

Step 9: Add Shading and Highlights

To give your drawing depth, add simple shading. Think about a light source coming from the upper left. Then:

- Darken the right side of Patrick's body with a darker pink or a light purple shadow.
- Add a white highlight (using a white gel pen or leaving paper white) on the top of his head and on the shiny parts of his eyes.
- Shade under his belly and shorts to create a sense of roundness.

Shading doesn't have to be complicated. Even a few strokes can make your Patrick look more three-dimensional and professional.

Step 10: Review and Refine

Take a step back and look at your finished artwork. Does it look like Patrick Star? Compare it to a reference if needed. Here are common fixes:

- If the eyes are too small, enlarge them. Patrick's eyes should take up a big part of his face.
- If the body is too skinny, go back and add more width.
- If the shorts are misplaced, adjust the belly line.

The beauty of drawing is that you can always try again. Many artists draw the same character multiple times before they're happy. But even your first attempt is a stepping stone to improvement.

Useful Tips for Perfecting

- **Keep it loose:** Patrick is a relaxed
