Foods to Avoid on a Low Sodium Low Carb Diet Menu

- **Cheese:** While most hard cheeses are low-carb, they can be high in sodium. Choose low-sodium or fresh cheese like mozzarella or ricotta in moderation.

Sample Low Sodium Low Carb Diet Menu for One Day

To help you visualize how these principles come together, here is a complete day’s menu. This plan provides approximately 1,500–1,800 calories, less than 1,500 mg of sodium, and fewer than 50 grams of net carbohydrates. Adjust portion sizes based on your individual needs.

Breakfast: Herb Scrambled Eggs with Avocado

Whisk 3 large eggs with a splash of unsweetened almond milk, a pinch of black pepper, and fresh chopped chives. Cook in 1 tablespoon of unsalted butter until just set. Serve with half a sliced avocado and a handful of fresh spinach. This meal is rich in healthy fats, protein, and fiber, with virtually no sodium and only about 4 grams of net carbs.

Lunch: Grilled Chicken Salad with Lemon Vinaigrette

Top a large bed of mixed greens with 5 ounces of grilled chicken breast

(seasoned with garlic powder, paprika, and a squeeze of lemon), sliced cucumber, cherry tomatoes, and a few slices of red onion. For dressing, whisk together 2 tablespoons of extra-virgin olive oil, 1 tablespoon of fresh lemon juice, and a pinch of salt-free Italian seasoning. Total sodium is under 200 mg, net carbs around 8 grams.

Afternoon Snack: Celery Sticks with Almond Butter

Take 3-4 celery stalks and spread 2 tablespoons of unsalted almond butter on them. This snack provides a crunchy, satisfying combination of fiber and healthy fat. Keep the almond butter to 1 serving to stay within low-carb limits (about 4 grams net carbs).

Dinner: Baked Salmon with Roasted Broccoli and Cauliflower Rice

Brush a 6-ounce salmon fillet with olive oil, sprinkle with dill and black pepper, and bake at 400°F for 12-15 minutes. Toss 1 cup of broccoli florets with olive oil and roast alongside the salmon. For the “rice,” pulse a head of cauliflower in a food processor and sauté in a pan with a little garlic and melted butter for 5 minutes. This dinner provides some protein, fiber, and less than 300 mg of sodium; net carbs total about 10 grams.

Optional Evening Treat: Coconut Chia Pudding

Mix 2 tablespoons of chia seeds with ½ cup of unsweetened coconut milk and a few drops of stevia (optional). Refrigerate for at least 2 hours or overnight. Top with a few fresh raspberries. This dessert has about 5 grams net carbs and negligible sodium.

Tips for Building Your Own Low Sodium Low Carb Diet Menu

Creating a sustainable eating plan requires a bit of preparation and a willingness to experiment with new ingredients. Here are strategies that work in real life.

Read Labels Carefully

- Carry a small travel-sized salt-free seasoning blend to add flavor to restaurant meals.

Overcome Them
