

One Hour Bible Study Lessons

Sample One Hour Bible Study Lesson Plans

- **Application:** Choose one piece of armor you feel you lack. Find a verse that reinforces that truth and memorize it this week.
- **Closing:** Pray for strength to put on the full armor daily.

Lesson 3: The Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-12)

- **Opening:** Think about the world’s definition of “blessed” (wealth, health, popularity). How does Jesus’ list differ?
- **Reading:** Read each beatitude, pausing after each.
- **Observation:** Who are the people described? (poor in spirit, mourners, meek, etc.) What promises are attached?
- **Interpretation:** Why does Jesus start with “poor in spirit”? How does the upside-down kingdom challenge our values?
- **Application:** Identify which beatitude you most need to grow in. For example, if you struggle with anger, focus on “blessed are the meek.”
- **Closing:** Thank God for the radical hope found in His kingdom.

Tips for Leading Effective One Hour Bible Study Lessons
