- **Word problem example:** “A pizza is cut into 8 slices. You eat 3 slices and your friend eats 2 slices. How much pizza did you both eat?”
Answer: $\frac{3}{8} + \frac{2}{8} = \frac{5}{8}$. Word problems bridge abstract math to real life.

$+ 1/5 = 1/2$ or $3/10$. Remedy: Slow down. Have them circle the numerators in red and underline the denominators in blue before adding.
