The story builds with more and more ridiculous mix-ups until finally, everyone sits down to a perfectly normal breakfast, except that Grandma is wearing her hat on her hand. This story plays with the idea of rules and order, which five-year-olds are just beginning to understand, and the role reversal of the child helping the adult is empowering and funny.
