Structural Bricks and Plates

- **1x2 Bricks with Holes:** These specialized bricks are designed to accept axles. They are critical for building frames that support moving parts.
- **1x4 Bricks with Holes:** Longer versions of the axle bricks, used for wider frames and supports.
- **1x16 Technic Bricks:** Standard Technic bricks used for long structural rails. They have holes along the entire length.
