Solution: This is a conservation of energy problem. Heat lost by metal = heat gained by water. For water: $Q = (100\text{ g})(4.18\text{ J/g}^\circ\text{C})(25^\circ\text{C} - 20^\circ\text{C}) = 100 \times 4.18 \times 5 = 2,090\text{ J}$. The metal loses 2,090 J. For metal: $\Delta T = 100^\circ\text{C} - 25^\circ\text{C} = 75^\circ\text{C}$. Using $Q = mc\Delta T$ rearranged: $c = Q / (m\Delta T) = 2,090\text{ J} / (50\text{ g} \times 75^\circ\text{C}) = 2,090 / 3,750 = 0.557\text{ J/g}^\circ\text{C}$. The specific heat of the metal is approximately 0.56 J/g°C, suggesting it might be a type of steel or iron.
