Recommended Ukulele Size

Ukulele Tab: Section by Section

The song is divided into several distinct sections, each requiring a different playing technique. Below, we explore each part in detail, including the chords, finger placements, and strumming patterns you need to know.

1. The Intro: A Cappella Piano Opening

One of the most recognizable moments in rock music, the intro begins with Freddie Mercury's solo voice accompanied by a soft piano. On ukulele, you can recreate this delicate mood with a gentle fingerpicking arpeggio. The key here is to play with a light touch and let each note ring clearly.

- **Main chords:** Bb, Gm, Cm, F7, Bb
- **Technique:** Pince or arpeggio pattern: thumb on the G string, then index on C, middle on E, and ring on A. Repeat slowly and evenly.
- **Tip:** "Is this the real life? Is this just fantasy?" These lines should feel intimate. Play softly and let the notes breathe.

For the **Bohemian Rhapsody Ukulele Tab** of this section, focus on the Bb major chord. Place your index finger on the first fret of the A string, your middle finger on the second fret of the C string, and your ring finger on the third fret of the E string. Strum only the top three strings or pluck them individually for that piano-like effect.

2. The Ballad Section: Caught in a Landslide

As the song progresses into the ballad proper, the chords become more emotional and the tempo remains slow and steady. This section is built around a repeating progression that shifts between major and minor keys, mirroring the lyrical themes of regret and longing.

- **Chords used:** Eb, Ab, Bb, Cm, Fm, Bb7
- **Strumming pattern:** Down, down-up, down-up. Keep it slow and consistent.
- **Key transition:** Moving from Eb to Ab requires a quick slide. Practice this transition until it becomes fluid.

Pay special attention to the line "Mama, just killed a man." The chord change from Eb to Ab should be smooth, and your strumming hand should maintain a gentle but steady rhythm. This is where the ukulele's warm tone really shines, adding a layer of vulnerability to the performance.

3. The Opera Section: Galileo and Figaro

This is the most complex and playful part of the song, featuring layered vocals, rapid key changes, and a sense of controlled chaos. On ukulele, you can capture this energy by alternating between fast strumming and quick chord changes. Do not worry about playing every single note from the original arrangement; instead, focus on the rhythmic feel and the dramatic shifts.

- **Chords used:** F, C, Dm, G, Bb, Eb, A
- **Strumming pattern:** Fast downstrokes on the beat, with

occasional upstrokes for accent.

- **Technique:** Use palm muting on the strings to create a percussive, almost spoken-word effect during the "Galileo" phrases.

One of the most fun parts of the **Bohemian Rhapsody Ukulele Tab** for the opera section is the rapid succession of chords during "I'm just a poor boy, nobody loves me." Keep your fret hand relaxed and your changes small. You do not need to lift your fingers far from the strings, which will help you maintain speed.

- **Strumming pattern:** Heavy downstrokes, with a strong accent on the first beat of each measure.
- **Tip:** Barre chords are essential here. Practice your barre on the fifth and sixth frets to build finger strength.

The line "So you think you can stone me and spit in my eye" should be played with raw energy. Dig your pick or fingers into the strings, and do not be afraid to play loudly. The contrast between this section and the earlier ballad is what makes the song so dramatic, so lean into the aggression.

5. The Outro: Nothing Really Matters

The song ends as it began, with a quiet, reflective piano and vocals. On ukulele, you should return to the fingerpicking style of the intro, bringing the performance full circle. The final chord should be held until the sound fades completely, leaving a sense of resolution and closure.

- **Final chords:** F, Eb, Bb, Gm, F
- **Technique:** Arpeggio slowly, letting each string ring out. Use a gradual diminuendo in your picking dynamics.
- **Emotional delivery:** "Nothing really matters, anyone can see." Play these final lines with tenderness and acceptance.

To help you practice efficiently, here is a consolidated list of the most important chords used in the song, along with their finger positions:

- **Bb:** Index on first fret of A string, middle on second fret of C string, ring on third fret of E string.
- **Gm:** Index on first fret of E string, middle on second fret of C string, ring on second fret of A string.
- **Cm:** Index on third fret of A string, middle on third fret of E string, ring on third fret of C string.
- **F7:** Index on first fret of E string, middle on first fret of G string, ring on first fret of C string.
- **Eb:** Barre on third fret with index, ring on fifth fret of A string,

middle on fourth fret of C string.

- **Ab:** Barre on first fret with index, ring on third fret of A string, middle on second fret of E string.
- **F:** Middle on second fret of G string, index on first fret of E string.
- **C:** Ring on third fret of A string, middle on second fret of C string.
- **Dm:** Middle on second fret of G string, ring on second fret of E string, index on first fret of A string.
- **G:** Index on second fret of C string, middle on second fret of E string, ring on third fret of A string.

If any of these chords feel unfamiliar, practice them individually before attempting the full song. Muscle memory is your best friend when learning a complex piece like this.

Strumming Patterns and Rhythmic Nuances

One of the biggest challenges when learning the **Bohemian Rhapsody Ukulele Tab** is capturing the song's rhythmic diversity. Each section demands a different approach to strumming or picking.

Ballad Strumming
