It's critical to listen to the recording to capture the **dynamics and slight rubato**. The tab provides the skeleton, but the feel comes from relaxed, lightly swung eighth notes.

Notable Hammer-Ons and Pull-Offs

Within the verse, Mayer often adds a hammer-on from the G string to the B string on the B chord. For instance, on the second beat, you might play an open G string then hammer onto the 4th fret (B string) while the thumb maintains the bass note. This creates a melodic flourish that makes the **John Mayer Half Of My Heart tab** more interesting than a mere chord chart. Look for these details:

Chord Voicings and Embellishments

- A major (x02220) – fingerpicked with a thumb on the A string.

Right-Hand Independence

Practice the thumb pattern separately: alternate between the low E and A strings, keeping a steady pulse. Then add the index, middle, and ring fingers on the treble strings.
