Needle decompression would come after if tension pneumothorax is confirmed, but oxygen is the immediate priority. An X-ray is part of the secondary survey, and IV access comes during the circulation phase.

Question 2: When performing the primary survey on a pediatric trauma patient, which finding would most likely indicate compensated shock?

- A. Hypotension
- B. Tachycardia with weak peripheral pulses
- C. Decreased urine output
- D. Altered mental status

Answer and Rationale: B. Tachycardia with weak peripheral pulses. In children, hypotension is a late and ominous sign of decompensated shock. The earliest sign of compensated shock is tachycardia, often accompanied by cool extremities and weak peripheral pulses. Decreased urine output and altered mental status also indicate progression but tachycardia is typically the first measurable change.

Question 3: A patient with a suspected spinal cord injury is being prepared for transport. Which of the following interventions is most important to maintain spinal immobilization?

- A. Applying a cervical collar only
- B. Securing the patient to a long spine board with straps and a cervical collar

- C. Placing the patient on a soft stretcher with pillows
- D. Using a scoop stretcher without head immobilization

Answer and Rationale: B. Securing the patient to a long spine board with straps and a cervical collar. Full spinal immobilization requires the entire body to be aligned and secured to prevent movement from the head to the pelvis. A cervical collar alone does not immobilize the thoracolumbar spine. The other options do not provide adequate stabilization.
