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wisdom that the average person could use to improve their life. He changed the world by democratizing philosophy.

The Cultural Shockwave of *Enter the Dragon*

No discussion of Lee's impact is complete without examining his magnum opus, *Enter the Dragon* (1973). This film was a perfect storm of talent, timing, and innovation. It was the first martial arts film to be produced by a major Hollywood studio (Warner Bros.) and shot in Hong Kong. The film's iconic tournament structure, the secret base in the jungle, and the final mirror sequence have been imitated countless times.

But the film's true impact was its global reach. *Enter the Dragon* grossed over \$90 million worldwide against a budget of well under \$1 million (adjusted for inflation, that's in the hundreds of millions). It literally created the "kung fu craze" of the 1970s. Suddenly, every little boy (and girl) in the West wanted to learn karate or kung fu. Dojos sprang up in every town. Nunchakus were sold in toy stores (and quickly banned in many schools). The film changed the world of action cinema forever, paving the way for the high-octane, wire-fu sequences seen in *The Matrix* and *Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon* decades later. The choreography, the rhythm, the sound design of his punches—all of it became the template

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for modern action.

The Enduring Enigma

Part of the reason **how Bruce Lee changed the world** is so profound is the mystery surrounding his untimely death. He died at the height of his fame, leaving behind a body of work that felt tragically incomplete. This amplified his legend. He became a martyr for his own art.
