- **Tat cards:** A Tat allows you to look at one of your own face-down cards or one opponent’s face-down card. This is crucial for memory.
- **Cat cards:** A Cat lets you steal a face-up card from an opponent’s row and add it to your own row, replacing one of your cards.

Ending the Game

The game ends immediately when any player yells “Rat a tat cat!” after completing their turn. That player must have the lowest total score among all players. To calculate your score, flip all your face-down cards face-up and add up the numbers. The player with the lowest total wins. But be careful—if someone yells prematurely and does not actually have the lowest score, they are penalized by adding

10 points to their total.

Strategies to Win at the Rat A Tat Cat Game
