1. A Clear and Relevant Subject Line

6. Address Any Missed Opportunities (Optional)

If during the interview you fumbled an answer or forgot to mention a key qualification, the thank-you email is a perfect place to clarify. For instance: *"I wanted to follow up on your question about my experience with Salesforce. Since our call, I remembered that I completed a certification course last year and successfully led a data migration project using that platform. I would be happy to provide more details."* This shows that you are reflective and proactive, and it helps fill any gaps in your interview performance.

7. A Call to Action or Next Steps

End the body of your email by expressing enthusiasm for the next stage in the process. You can ask politely about the timeline or simply say that you look forward to hearing from them. Example: *"I look forward to the possibility of meeting with the team in person. Please let me know if there is any additional information I can provide."*

8. A Professional Closing

Use a standard closing such as *Best regards*, *Sincerely*, or *Thank you again*, followed by your full name, phone number, and LinkedIn profile link (if appropriate). Including your contact details makes it easy for the interviewer to reach you without searching for your resume.

Common Mistakes to Avoid

Even a well-intentioned thank-you email can backfire if it includes certain errors. Keep the following pitfalls in mind:

1. **Being too generic.** Avoid copying and pasting a template without personalisation. Recruiters can spot a form letter instantly.
2. **Making it too long.** The email should be concise. Aim for three to four short paragraphs. Do not rehash your entire resume.
3. **Using the wrong name or title.** Double-check the spelling of the interviewer's name and their preferred title. A mistake here signals carelessness.
