Step-by-Step Guide to Playing the Song

The Bridge: A Moment of Reflection

The bridge (the "Little darling, it's been a long cold lonely winter" section) introduces a slight change in feel. The rhythm becomes more defined, and the chords shift to include a G major. In the **mandolin tab**, this is often notated with more syncopation. The G chord on the

using the open G string and the D string at the second fret, which gives it a low, warm sound. This section is an excellent place to experiment with dynamics. Play the first half of the bridge slightly softer, then build intensity as the line repeats. The tab will likely indicate a return to the main riff at the end of the bridge, so be prepared to transition smoothly from strumming chords back to picking single notes.

Advanced Techniques for an Authentic Sound

- **Drones and Open Strings:**

Common Challenges and How to Overcome Them

Every mandolin player hits roadblocks when learning a new piece. Here are a few common challenges specific to this song and how to address them.

1. **The Fast Descending Riff:** Many players struggle with the speed and accuracy of the opening riff. The best solution is to practice it in

small chunks. Play the first three notes, then the next three, then the next three. Once you can play each chunk perfectly, gradually piece them together. Use a metronome and do not increase the speed until you can play the section without mistakes at the current tempo.

2. **Smooth Chord Transitions:** Moving from an A chord to a G chord can be tricky on the mandolin because the hand position changes significantly. Practice the

slowly, focusing on moving your entire hand as a unit. Keep your fingers close to the fretboard to minimize unnecessary movement.

Over time, the muscle memory will develop.

3. Keeping the Rhythm

Bouncy: "Here Comes The Sun" has a subtle swing that is hard to capture. Listen to the original recording repeatedly, focusing on where George Harrison places his accents. Record yourself playing along and compare it

to the track. You will likely notice moments where you are rushing or dragging. Adjust your internal metronome until it feels natural.
