Common Repairs Guided by the Service Manual

Valve Clearance Adjustment

Adjusting the tappets is a regular maintenance task that directly affects engine power and noise. The manual also tells you the exact order in which to turn the engine over to ensure the cam follower is on the base circle of the camshaft for each valve. Carburetor Syncing (Modern Twin)

On a fuel-injected Bonneville 750, balancing the throttle bodies ensures smooth idling and even power delivery. This process is impossible to do accurately without the manufacturer's specifications and diagram.

Maintenance Schedule for the Triumph 750
