Sample Nursing Vital Signs Shift Report Sheet Template

To help you get started, here is a sample outline for a **Nursing Vital Signs Shift Report Sample Sheet** that you can adapt for your own use. This template is designed for a general medical-surgical unit but can be modified for specialty areas.

- **Patient Information:** Name, MRN, DOB, Room, Allergies, Code Status, Isolation, Attending MD
- **Vital Signs Grid:** Date, Time, Temp (and route), Pulse (rate/rhythm), RR, BP (position), SpO2, O2 device and rate, Pain scale
- **Intake and Output:** Oral, IV, other intake, urine output, other output, net balance, last recorded weight

- **Respiratory Assessment:** Lung sounds, cough, sputum, ventilator settings (if applicable)
- **Cardiovascular Assessment:** Heart rhythm, edema, capillary refill, peripheral pulses
- **Gastrointestinal and Genitourinary:** Bowel sounds, last BM, diet, nausea/vomiting, urinary catheter, output
- **Skin and Wounds:** Skin integrity, pressure injuries, surgical wounds, drains, dressings
- **Medication and IV Access:** IV site assessment, IV fluids, drips, next scheduled doses
- **Lab and Diagnostic Results:** Critical lab values, pending tests, imaging results
- **Plan of Care and Pending Tasks:** Consults, procedures, discharge planning, patient education needs
- **Narrative Summary:** Offgoing nurse's brief note on any significant events, concerns, or follow-up needs

This template can be printed on a single page, double-sided, or expanded to a two-page format depending on the complexity of the patient population. The key is to make it comprehensive enough to capture essential data, but not so lengthy that it becomes a burden to complete.

Integrating the Shift Report Sheet with Electronic Health Records
