The lyrics “Oh, the overwhelming, never-ending, reckless love of God” declare an extravagant love that pursues relentlessly. It is frequently used in seasons of refreshing and renewal, and its chorus invites personal and corporate response.

6. “Spirit Break Out” by Kim Walker-Smith

A classic from Jesus Culture, this song is a direct invitation for the Holy Spirit to move in power. The repetitive lines “Spirit break out, break our walls down” create an atmosphere of expectation. It is often used in prophetic worship sessions where breakthrough is sought—Spiritually, emotionally, or physically.

7. “Let It Rain” by Michael Farren
