1. Soil and Ground Conditions

Soil type has a direct impact on drilling difficulty and therefore on cost.

Soft, sandy soils are easier to bore through, resulting in lower costs per foot.

Clay soils can be moderately difficult, while **rocky or cobble-filled**

ground significantly increases wear on drill bits and slows progress. Hard rock may require special tooling and even rock-reaming, pushing the **HDD cost per foot**

2. Bore Length and Depth

Longer bores often benefit from economies of scale — the mobilization cost is spread over more feet, potentially lowering the per-foot rate.
