

Vbs Schedule Template

Recreation and Games

Physical activity is essential for burning off energy and building teamwork. Plan outdoor or indoor games that tie into the theme where possible. A well-timed recreation break can rejuvenate the group for the next session.

Snack Time

Never underestimate the power of a snack! This is also a great opportunity for informal conversation with children. Coordinate snack time with your kitchen or volunteer team and ensure your template accounts for preparation and distribution.

Music and Worship

Music is a cornerstone of VBS. Whether it's singing original VBS songs, learning motions, or having a dance party, this segment should be lively and participative. Many templates schedule music both at the opening and as a separate rotation.

Closing or Dismissal

The end of the day should be just as organized as the beginning. A closing assembly can recap the day's lesson, give announcements, and offer a moment of prayer. Your template must include a clear dismissal procedure to reunite children with parents or guardians safely.

How to Build Your Own VBS Schedule Template

Creating a custom **Vbs Schedule Template** from scratch might seem daunting, but it can be broken down into simple, logical steps. By following this process, you will produce a schedule that is tailored to your church's unique facilities, volunteer numbers, and program length.

Step 1: Determine Your Total Time Frame

Step 5: Build in Buffer Time

Step 6: Test and Adjust

11:05 AM - 11:15 AM: Mission Moment or Offering

11:15 AM - 11:40 AM: Group Activities or Free Play

11:40 AM - 11:55 AM: Closing Assembly (Recap, announcements, prayer)

11:55 AM - 12:00 PM: Dismissal

Tips for Using a VBS Schedule Template Effectively
