What Is the Invincible Compendium 2?

The **Invincible Compendium 2** is the second of three massive paperback collections that reprint the entire 144-issue main series, plus various spin-off material. Specifically, this compendium gathers **Invincible #48–#96** along with the *Invincible Returns* one-shot and selected short stories from the *Invincible Universe* series. That is nearly 50 issues of non-stop action, character development, and shocking twists.

Printed on softcover, newsprint-quality paper (similar to standard manga volumes), the compendium is designed to be an affordable, binge-friendly alternative to the smaller trade paperbacks or expensive hardcovers. At over 1,000 pages, it is a hefty tome that offers tremendous value. While it lacks the glossy paper and sketchbook extras of the *Invincible: Ultimate Collection* hardcovers, the compendium’s sheer volume of story for the price makes it the go-to choice for many readers.

Issues Included in Detail

- Invincible #48–#60** – The immediate aftermath of the first major war, new villains, and deepening family drama.
- Invincible #61–#70** – The infamous “Invincible War” arc and the introduction of the Angstrom Levy alternate-reality storyline.
- Invincible #71–#84** – The Viltrumite War, perhaps the series’ most epic conflict, with universe-altering consequences.
- Invincible #85–#96** – The fall-out from the war, new leadership on Viltrum, and the beginning of the endgame for several characters.
- Invincible Returns #1** – A special one-shot that bridges narrative gaps.
- Invincible Universe #1–#2** – Expands the world of supporting heroes.

In short, this compendium covers the teenage-to-early-adulthood phase of Mark Grayson’s life, where his responsibilities as a hero clash violently with his personal relationships and his alien heritage.

Major Story Arcs Inside Invincible Compendium 2

The **Invincible Compendium 2** is packed with storylines that have become legendary among comic readers. Below are the most significant arcs you will encounter.

The Invincible War

Perhaps the most talked-about event in the series, the Invincible War sees the villain Angstrom Levy (previously introduced in compendium one) gather evil counterparts of Mark from alternate dimensions. These twisted versions of Invincible launch a coordinated attack on Earth, causing massive casualties. Kirkman uses this arc to explore the hero’s guilt and the idea that even a well-intentioned hero can have a dark mirror. The action is relentless, and the body count is shocking—even for a mature-rated comic.

The Viltrumite War

The Viltrumite War is the centerpiece of the compendium. Mark, his father Nolan (Omni-Man), and a handful of allies launch an assault on the Viltrumite homeworld. The stakes could not be higher: the fate of Earth and countless other planets hangs in the balance. This arc features some of Ryan Ottley’s most detailed splash pages, with battles that span entire planets. It also provides crucial character development for Nolan, who transitions from a villain to a complex anti-hero. The resolution of this war reshapes the entire Invincible universe.

The Reboot? – The “ReBoot” Arc

Following the Viltrumite War, the series takes a surprising turn. Without giving too much away, Mark faces a threat that literally rewrites reality—not once, but twice. The “ReBoot” storyline (issues #80–#84) is a high-concept science fiction twist that allows Kirkman to reset certain status quos while also paying off long-running plot threads. It also introduces a new villain that tests Mark’s morality in ways he has never been tested before.

Eve’s Pregnancy and Family Dynamics

Amid all the cosmic battles, Kirkman never loses sight of the human (and alien) relationships. A major subplot involves Atom Eve’s pregnancy and the birth of Mark and Eve’s daughter. This arc examines how a superhero family copes with the dangers of their lifestyle. It also leads to one of the series’ most heartbreaking moments—a scene that will leave you staring at the page in silence. The **Invincible Compendium 2** balances soap-opera drama

with world-shattering action, and this family thread is the emotional anchor of the entire collection.

Art and Writing: The Kirkman-Ottley Dream Team

By the time you reach the material in **Invincible Compendium 2**, the art has fully settled into the iconic style of Ryan Ottley. While Cory Walker drew the early issues, Ottley took over from issue #8 onward and defined the visual identity of the series. In this compendium, his linework is confident, his action choreography is breathtaking, and his facial expressions convey every ounce of Kirkman’s dialogue.

Kirkman’s writing, meanwhile, reaches its peak. He masterfully juggles multiple plot threads—the Viltrumite politics, Mark’s personal life, the fate of the Guardians of the Globe, and the looming threat of new villains. The pacing is tight, and every issue ends with a cliffhanger that makes it nearly impossible to put the book down. If you enjoyed the first compendium, you will find that **Invincible Compendium 2** raises the bar in both scale and emotional weight.

Color and Lettering

Credit must also go to colorist John Rauch (and later, Jean-François Beaulieu) and letterer Russ Wooton. The colors in these issues shift from bright, classic superhero hues to darker, more subdued palettes during the war arcs. The lettering is clean, with sound effects that are integrated into the art rather than obscuring it. Everything works together to create a cohesive reading experience that feels cinematic.

Invincible Compendium 2 vs. Other Formats

When deciding how to collect *Invincible*, you have several options. Here is how the compendium compares to the alternatives.

Compendiums (Softcover)

- Pros:** Largest amount of content per dollar; easy to hold despite size; uniform spine for bookshelf.
- Cons:** Newsprint-style paper; no oversized art; no extras or variant covers.

Trade Paperbacks (Volumes 1–25)

- Pros:** Portable; each covers a small story arc; higher paper quality.
- Cons:** Expensive if buying all 25 volumes; much harder to find some volumes in print.

Ultimate Collection (Hardcovers, Volumes 1–12)

- Pros:** Oversized art (makes Ottley’s work shine); bonus content; durable.
- Cons:** Very expensive; out of print for some volumes; heavy and bulky.

Library Editions (Hardcover Omnibus)

There is also a hardcover library edition that collects the same material as the compendium but with better paper and a slipcase. However, the price is significantly higher. For most readers, the **Invincible Compendium 2** offers the best bang for your buck. If you are a budget-conscious fan who wants to read the entire story without hunting down out-of-print volumes, go with the compendiums.

Why This Compendium Is Essential for New and Returning Readers

If you have only seen the animated series on Amazon Prime, the **Invincible Compendium 2** will contain material that the show has not yet adapted (as of 2025). The first season covered roughly issues #1–#13, with some deviations. Season two is expected to go up to around issue #30, so the compendium still contains dozens of issues that are entirely new to show-only fans. Reading the comics will give you a richer understanding of the characters’ motivations and the wider universe.

For returning readers who read the series as floppies, this compendium is a great way to revisit the middle act without digging through longboxes. The continuous flow of the story—reading 20 issues in a sitting—reveals connections that might be missed when reading month to month.

Key Characters and Their Development

While the compendium focuses primarily on Mark Grayson, several other characters undergo major transformations.

Mark Grayson / Invincible

Mark begins this compendium as a young hero still learning the ropes, but by the end of issue #96, he has become a leader, a father, and a warrior who has killed to protect those he loves. His moral code is tested again and again, and he emerges hardened but not broken.

Omni-Man (Nolan Grayson)

Nolan’s redemption arc is one of the most compelling in comics. After his betrayal in the first compendium, he spends this entire volume trying to atone. His relationship with Mark goes from estranged to fiercely loyal. The Viltrumite War arc gives him some of the best scenes in the series.

Atom Eve (Samantha Eve Wilkins)

Eve is not just a love interest; she is a powerhouse in her own right. In this compendium, she deals with her own legacy, her pregnancy, and a devastating loss that changes her powers forever. Her character arc is handled with sensitivity and strength.

Cecil Stedman

The enigmatic head of the Global Defense Agency returns with even more morally ambiguous decisions. His rivalry with Mark escalates, leading to one of the most intense confrontations in the entire series. Cecil is a fantastic foil to Mark’s idealism.

Angstrom Levy

While introduced earlier, Levy becomes a primary antagonist
