12. **What is the highest court in the United States?**
The Supreme Court.

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them

Even well-prepared applicants can slip up. Here are typical pitfalls and solutions:

- **Confusing similar answers.**

Example: Mixing up the number of voting members in the House (435) with the number of Senators (100). Use

mnemonic devices: “House has more people, so more representatives (435).”

- **Forgetting current officeholders.** The test requires the name of the current President, Vice President, Speaker of the House, and your state’s governors and senators.
