- 1999:** .285 AVG, 48 HR, 134 RBI — his final full season in Seattle before the trade.

During that decade, Griffey led the American League in home runs four times (1994, 1997-1999). He also collected 10 consecutive Gold Glove Awards (1990-1999) for his spectacular defense in center field, a rare combination of power and glove work. By the time he left Seattle, his **Ken Griffey Jr career stats** already included 398 home runs, 1,152 RBIs, and a .299 batting average—numbers that promised even greater heights.

The Cincinnati Years: Injuries and Perseverance (2000-2008)

In February 2000, in one of the most blockbuster trades in MLB history, Griffey was sent to the Cincinnati Reds. Expectations were enormous: a hometown hero (Griffey grew up in Cincinnati as the son of Reds star Ken Griffey Sr.) and a chance to chase 600, even 700, home runs. But injuries began to take their toll. Hamstring strains, torn knee cartilage, and a torn tendon in his foot limited him to fewer than 100 games in 2000, 2001, 2002, and 2004.

Despite the setbacks, Griffey still produced impressive stretches. In 2000 he hit 40 home runs in 145 games, even with a .271 average. In 2005 he bounced back with 35 homers and 92 RBIs, and in 2007 he clubbed 30 home runs, reaching the 30-homer mark for the 11th time in his career. Those seasons added crucial totals to his **Ken Griffey Jr career stats**, pushing him closer to the 600-homer milestone.

Defensively, the injuries forced a move to corner outfield, but his reputation remained intact. By the end of his Reds tenure (2008 mid-season trade), Griffey had accumulated 210 home runs and 603 RBIs in Cincinnati, bringing his career totals to 608 home runs, 1,755 RBIs, and a .289 average.

Late Career: White Sox and a Farewell in Seattle (2008-2010)

After a trade to the Chicago White Sox in July 2008, Griffey appeared in 41 games, hitting .260 with 3 home runs. The following season, in 2009, he returned to where it all began—the Seattle Mariners. The sentimental homecoming was a storyline of redemption, even if the numbers were diminished. At 39, Griffey hit .214 with 19 home runs and 57 RBIs in 117 games. He followed that with a final season in 2010, batting .184 in 33 games before retiring.

Those final years added only modest totals, but they allowed Griffey to reach 630 home runs—sixth all-time at the time of his retirement—and cement his place in history. His final all-time **Ken Griffey Jr career stats** read: 2,736 hits, 1,836 RBIs, 1,662 runs scored, and a .284 batting average.

Offensive Production: The Complete Hitter

Griffey was not merely a home run hitter; he was a well-rounded offensive force. His career slash line of .284/.370/.538 (batting average / on-base percentage / slugging percentage) reflects a player who got on base, hit for average, and provided elite power. His career OPS (on-base plus slugging) of .907 ranks among the best for outfielders in history.

For instance, from 1991 to 1999, his defensive value was comparable to elite center fielders like Andruw Jones.
