What Are Runescape Treasure Trails Maps?

Treasure Trails are a members-only activity in OSRS where players receive a clue scroll that leads them through a series of steps. These steps often require solving anagrams, cryptics, coordinate clues, or simply digging at a specific location indicated on a **Runescape Treasure Trails Maps**. The maps themselves are visual representations of a specific area within the game. They are deliberately drawn in an old-fashioned, hand-drawn style, with landmarks such as trees, rocks, buildings, or bodies of water serving as reference points.

Additionally, hard clues frequently require puzzle boxes (a slider puzzle) and anagrams. The loot table includes blessed dragonhide armor, third-age items, and godsword shards.
- **Elite Clue Scrolls:** Elite trails are even more demanding. Their maps may cover large areas or require you to use quest-specific teleports and items. Elite clues also bring in celtic knots and sophisticated coordinate clues. Rewards are among the best, including the chance at the third-age druidic set and the

powerful heavy casket.

- **Master Clue Scrolls:** Introduced later in the game, master clues are the pinnacle of treasure hunting. They combine all previous mechanics and add new ones, including cryptic clues that require completing other clue scrolls. The **Runescape Treasure Trails Maps** for master clues are among the most intricate, often featuring multi-step instructions or requiring you to use specific emote actions in front of certain NPCs. The rewards include the legendary bloodhound pet and the ornamental kits for the dragon defender and other items.

How to Obtain Clue Scrolls and Their Maps

Before you can start using **Runescape Treasure Trails Maps**, you must acquire a clue scroll. They can be obtained from a wide variety of sources, with the tier of the clue depending on the monster or activity you engage in. Here are the most common methods:

1. **Easy Clues:** Pickpocketing H.A.M. members in the H.A.M. Hideout yields easy clues quickly. You can also kill low-level monsters like goblins, men, or chickens, but pickpocketing is more efficient.
2. **Medium Clues:** Killing guards in Falador or Varrock is a classic method. Alternatively, pickpocketing the H.A.M. members also has a chance to yield medium clues, or you can open impling jars (eclectic, nature, and magpie implings).
3. **Hard Clues:** Slayer tasks are the primary source for hard clues. Any monster that can be assigned by a Slayer master has a chance to drop hard clues. Popular choices include Hellhounds in the Wilderness or the Catacombs of Kourend, and dust devils.

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- 4. **Elite Clues:** The best sources are killing high-level monsters such as Lizardman Shamans, brutal dragons, and certain bosses like Zulrah or Vorkath. Skilling activities like mining runite ore or cutting yew trees also have a rare chance.
 - 5. **Master Clues:** You cannot obtain a master clue scroll directly from monster drops. Instead, you must combine a completed hard, elite, and easy clue scroll (each of the five tiers) using a workbench in the housing of the Wise Old Man in Draynor Village. Alternatively, you can receive them as a rare reward from the Treasure Trails themselves.

Using the Compass and Scale

The maps have a compass rose that indicates north (usually an arrow or a letter N). The scale is often accurate, so a small map suggests a small area, while a large map might represent a whole region like the Feldip Hills or the wilderness coastline. Pay attention to the relative distances between landmarks.

Common Locations for Each Tier

Experienced clue hunters memorize common map locations. Here are a few examples for each tier:

- **Easy:** The farming patch south of Falador, the Draynor Village jail, the church in Lumbridge, and the crossroads near the Wizards' Tower.
- **Medium:** The Catherby beach, the Ardougne Zoo, the Yanille agility dungeon, and the area near the fishing platform in Entrana.
- **Hard:** The Wilderness agility course (near the moss giants), the entrance to the Lava Maze, the Trollheim area, and the inside of the Tree Gnome Village maze.
- **Elite:** The Kourend Woodland, the area near the Wintertodt camp, and the isle of Miscellania.
- **Master:** The inside of the Motherlode Mine, the top floor of the Ardougne castle, and the entrances to various God Wars Dungeon bosses.

Once you have a clue scroll, the first step will often provide you with a **Runescape Treasure Trails Maps** or another type of clue. Simply right-click the clue scroll and select "Read" to see the clue.

1. **Prepare Your Inventory:** Always carry a spade, a light source (for dark areas), and teleport runes or teleportation items for key locations. For hard and above, bring a ring of dueling, games necklace, and amulet of glory for quick teleports to hotspots.
2. **Use Teleportation Effectively:** Many clues are located near a teleport location. For example, the Varrock and Falador teleport tablets are essential for easy and medium clues. For the Wilderness, use burning amulets or the Wilderness Obelisks.
3. **Manage Your Clue Bottleneck:** You can only carry one clue scroll of each tier at a time. If you have a hard clue and are waiting for a monster to drop another, you must complete the current one. However, you can store one completed clue (the sealed version) in your bank while working on another.
4. **Puzzle Boxes and Celtic Knots:** For hard and elite clues, you

will encounter slider puzzles. Learning to solve them methodically—using the "row-by-row" method—can save minutes per clue. Celtic knots for elite clues require you to align colored strands; practice with online simulators if needed.

5. **Coordinate Clues:** Some clues provide coordinates that you must decipher using a sextant, watch, and chart. You can use the Observatory or the clue plugin to convert coordinates to in-game tiles. Alternatively, simply use the RuneLite plugin that does the work for you.
