

How To Retract A Bid On Ebay

Time Limits and Restrictions

eBay enforces strict time windows for bid retractions. Generally, you can retract a bid within a few minutes of placing it, but the exact cutoff depends on the remaining auction time. For auctions with more than 12 hours left, you have more flexibility. For auctions ending sooner, your options are limited.
